As we prepare to celebrate the 60th anniversary as a liberal religious community in northwest Florida next month, you are facing some big decisions about the direction of the future of this congregation. When I was called to serve as the full-time settled minister twelve years ago, it was the culmination of a long congregational process that reached a clear commitment to support the presence of professional ministry as part of the program life of the church.

It may be hard to fathom, but UUCP has become the flagship congregation of the Gulf Coast region with the vitality of our congregational life in these past twelve years. We are the only congregation to work with a full-time minister in the large area between New Orleans to Tallahassee, and northward to Montgom-

ery. None of the other five congregations within that radius have UU ministers (Gulfport, Mobile, Fairhope, Valparaiso and Panama City). *We literally are a beacon for liberal religion in the Deep South along the Gulf Coast.*

While it is difficult to say goodbye to a community of Unitarian Universalists I have loved these past years, I am confident that your future is bright. It has truly been an honor and privilege for me to serve with you. As you reflect on your personal commitments to the Unitarian Universalist Church of Pensacola in its coming year, I hope you can share in the sense of pride that I have in what a special community it is, and that you find it easy to lend your support to see that it continues to thrive and grow. We make an invaluable difference in the lives of our members and in the

larger community. It's well worth the investment of your commitments!

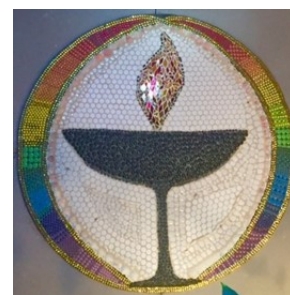

Last name E-L: Please bring veggie trays or simple salads (like potato salad, coleslaw or macaroni salad)

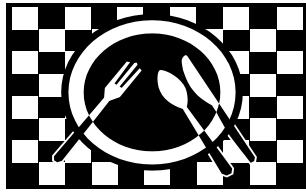
Last name M-Z: Please bring brownies, cookies, cupcakes or chips (to go with those lovely sandwiches). We’ll have a cake, too.

LET'S EAT!

LUUNCH BUUNCH



For 14 March's Lunch Bunch, we'll visit the recently PNJ profiled Mr. Shawarma - a (largely) takeout operation with about 9 stool (no back) seats facing a fixed bar on the north wall, as well as two high "tables" with stool-type seats, and outside, 3 small tables with two chairs each. (A third (high) folding chair would expand seats by 50%.) ... The menu is much more enticing than the accommodations, provided that you are fond of Middle Eastern fare, including its usual vegetarian fare. (Shawarma is meat - chicken in this case - which is layered on a vertical spit, from which it is carved to go into a pita wrap, or in a salad, with carryout "plates")...Mr. S.'s address is 6215-C North 9th Ave. (west side) about mid-way between Schwab and Langley Avenues; its smallish parking lot also supports a tattoo parlor (the notable top of the sign)... As usual, Q&A for this adventure is to Hugh T. at 478-2373 by Monday or 501-5142 on the 2nd Wednesday of 14 March, about 1:00 PM...Please note that being strictly takeout, seat reservations are only done by your friends that precede you. Let's hope for good weather and a few extra chairs outside. By 12:50, you may as well go in and order, find a seat and wait for the rest of us.

For 14/2's Valentine Day's Lunch Bunch, we visited the Fishing Hole at 15 East Brent. It's not enough to say that it was good; my hush-puppies were some of the best in recent memory, the fried catfish very light, warm and tasty, and the coleslaw/dressing very easy on the palate. Eating at the Fishing Hole could become addictive and weight bearing...I had reserved for 10-12 seats; 12 were provided with end seat space available, making 14; then a becoming- regular (but geographically weak) member showed up for a total of 15...Despite the quiet and soothing decor, the Fishing Hole's conversational noise was a bit much, but when the food came, it was less of a factor, and by this 1:30'ish time, the restaurant crowd was beginning to thin out, and the food also quieted our noise.

After the Fishing Hole, I realized that two regulars and one who had expressed intent were missing, making 18 possible. Then I got home to discover a phone message desiring directions, and heard on Friday of still one more (both not then but now on the Lunch Bunch email list), so we could have run to 20. It puts me in mind of reserving two tables of 10 next time...and should inform the unobservant that reservations are really almost a necessity (and that "non-reservers" will go to table B). This may apply for the April LB event.

We're trying a newer place to eat this Second Sunday Lunch Out. Anyone at UUCP is invited, visitors to long-term members and everyone in between. We are planning ahead to go to Southpaw Grill, 6705 Pine Forest Rd., across from the Fairgrounds. This is locally owned by a Lake Charles LA transplant, so there will be a Cajun and Creole flair, but I'm assured there's a good variety of grilled or fried seafood and other dishes, not particularly peppery, as well as plate meals and sandwiches, including po-boys. As a LA native long married into a Cajun family, I have pretty high demands, so we'll see. Reviews seem excellent, and they sounded nice when I called. Whether we go at 11:30 or 12:30 depends on who I hear from BEFORE Sunday March 11, and what preferences are indicated. I'm flexible and can be influenced, based on what else is happening 2nd hour and who wants to go when. You will be able to join us without reservations prior to Sunday, but I'd REALLY appreciate knowing sooner, so that I know what to expect and can tell restaurants what to expect. Attendance has ranged from about 4-14 people and we always seem to enjoy good conversation, good times, good people and usually good food. I hope you'll join us.

Would you like to be part of UUCP's past and future in one upcoming activity? Please contribute representations of yourself and each family member to our 60th Anniversary Time Capsule. Items are being collected now through the last Sunday service in March (the 25th), for burial April 8. The large basket with the multicolor bow is available now on the buffet cabinet, just inside our lobby.

Please make sure whatever you put in is securely closed inside a ziplock bag, either snack, sandwich, or quart size, or up to a gallon for your whole family. Put names in waterproof marker on the outside of the bag. Ages could also be a good idea, if you are willing.

Here are some items to consider, though what you put in is up to you:

- ★ Identified photographs of yourself and your beloved people, places, pets, landscapes, views, etc.
- ★ Favorite songs or other entertainment or activities.
- ★ UUCP Sunday bulletins, *Lights*, special events or other church ephemera of cherished memories.
- ★ Small books, art, poems, or other samples of your personal creativity.
- ★ Representatives of social action issues and/or events important to you.
- ★ Names of or information about people who matter most in your life now or from the past.
- ★ Your pre-written vision for the future, for our church, for yourself, for your family, for the larger community or for the world.
- ★ A meaningful tangible item, such as a toy or piece of jewelry, that is small and flat enough to fit in a ziplock.

We also hope to have a time during a March service to supply cards to have everyone attending quickly do brief lines of individual hopes and dreams for UUCP.

Additionally, as TC space allows, we'll consider items that more broadly represent our town, state, nation, and world, at this time in our collective history. We welcome your ideas.

We'd like every member, friend, and attending child to contribute so this 60th Anniversary Time Capsule truly represents our entire UUCP community. A decade from now, it will be quite interesting to review what's there, remember ourselves then, including any no longer with us. This truly is an activity where MORE is better.

Meanwhile, you might like to check out the table up front displaying items from our 50th Anniversary Time Capsule, which was opened Feb. 18. This collection will be available for a couple of weeks, then everyone may take his or her items back before the last March service. Should you want to replace something of yours in the basket for the next capsule, that's OK too.

Since this IS a community project, anyone may see what everyone else puts in, so please consider that openness as you decide what to include.

So far, the ingenious PVC pipe capsule designed and made by the late **Ron Berthelot**, has remained air tight, free from moisture and dirt. HOWEVER, we can't promise that, so you might not want to inter valuable jewels or any precious, irreplaceable item.

This year, we will reuse the Time Capsule Ron made in 1988 for our 30th Anniversary at 904 E. Scott Street. It was transferred to our present facility and used again in 2008 with additional lettering by **JJ Jackson**. Ron also made the concrete chalice in the lawn beside the front patio. The TC will be reinterred there April 8. Thanks to **Lisa Hudson's family, Ken Duffy, Drake and Logan Talley** for uncovering, resealing, and the upcoming re-burying.

SOCIAL JUSTICE NEWS

The Florida legislature is considering bills which will be very harmful to our ecosystem, our schools, and our right to privacy. Please look through the list below and email or call your representative and/or our senator and let them know that we do not favor these bills. Or choose one issue or bill to contact them about. Florida Execution Actions/Vigils/Protests

Tell Florida Governor Rick Scott to halt ALL executions! Scott ordered the execution of Eric Branch for Thursday, February 22nd at 6pm ET. Branch was sentenced to death under Florida's now unconstitutional sentencing scheme (U.S. Supreme Court, Hurst v Florida 2016) after being convicted of killing Susan Morris in 1994.

Florida House Actions

The following bills have passed all their Committee stops and are on the House Calendar paving the way for a vote as early as **Tuesday, Feb. 20**. **Call or email now and urge your Representative to vote 'NO'** on each of the following for reasons listed below.

HB7043 State Assumption of Federal Section 404 Dredge and Fill Permitting Authority

- Florida has more wetlands than any other state. Wetlands are considered valuable because they absorb flood water, filter out pollution and provide habitat for important species of wildlife.
- There is no guarantee that an underfunded and understaffed Florida DEP will be able to resist pressure from builders and developers and provide due diligence and oversight to protect Florida's water supply for all its citizens.

HB0839 The Display of the State Motto

- This bill will require the State Motto 'In God We Trust' to be displayed in every classroom. Religious instruction must be reserved for the home and places of worship – not in public schools.

HB0001 Hope Scholarship Program

- This bill diverts public school funding to unaccountable private schools.

HB1429 Dismemberment Abortion

- This bill bans one of Florida's most common abortion procedures, often performed during the second trimester and would prohibit doctors from using tools such as forceps and clamps during dilation and evacuation procedures, commonly called D&Es, except when a patient's life is in danger.

- This bill interferes with the doctor-patient relationship and undermines doctors' abilities to provide the best medical care for their patients.
