June 3 — "Our Once and Future Church-Part 1" Rev. Bob Eddy In this two-part message, our Minister Emeritus will survey the obscure roots of liberal religion in our city. June 17 — "Still Coming Out After 40 Years" Thom Botsford, UUCP Member

Thom will use his own experience coming out in the 1970s, in George Wallace's Alabama no less, to explore self-reliance and "double consciousness" (a term from W.E.B. Du Bois). We will also enjoy the music of guest musician Chris Saunders.

June 24 — LGBTQ Pride Service: "Is Your Privilege Showing?" UUCP Member Debra Dubose, LSCW, ASCW

The Words of Reflection and message will focus on the history of the LGBTQ Pride Celebration. We will discuss the effect of heterosexual and cisgender privilege through the sharing of poetry and personal events with an opportunity for each of us to examine our own experiences of privilege. Musician: Bobby van Deusen. Service for All Ages.

July 1 — "Hinduism and UU—Many Similarities" Dr. M. Lal Goel, UUCP Member

Hinduism, the 5,000-year-old spiritual tradition of India, has many similarities with the UU philosophy and world view: from emphasis on cultural and ethnic pluralism, to the worship of the female Deity, to the presence of Godhead within. Hindus do not subscribe to the doctrine of "Original Sin" and hence the need for a Savior. Meditation, prayer and righteous living are emphasized as a pathway to the Divine. Dr. Goel will highlight the similarities as well as describe certain differences in world views between Hinduism and UU. He was born and raised in India, and received higher education both in India and the US.

Update on Interim Minister Search

From the Executive Committee of the Board

A lot has happened since March, when the congregation voted to pursue interim ministry. We'd like to use this space to provide regular updates for as long as the search continues.

As most of you probably know, May 20 was Rev. Dr. Julie Kain's last Sunday in the pulpit. In her last message, she talked about the potential for grief and a sense of loss, on her side and ours. She shared some of her own feelings about leaving and mentioned feelings of disappointment regarding a request for compensation in lieu of unused sabbatical not being given "a fair process for consideration."

Twelve years ago, when this congregation called Rev. Julie to be our settled minister, a Letter of Agreement between the church and the minister, stating the terms of her employment and ministry with us, was negotiated and signed by both parties. Under that Letter of Agreement, the minister becomes eligible for six months of sabbatical leave to pursue "study, education, writing, and other forms of professional and religious growth," that benefit both the minister and the church. The terms of the Letter provide that sabbatical leave dates and a plan for filling the minister's duties must be approved a year in advance of the leave; the minister cannot resign for at least one year after returning from sabbatical leave; and in the event of "resignation, termination, or retirement, any unused sabbatical leave is not compensable." Our minister took three months of sabbatical leave after her first six years of service, then three more months after her seventh year, during which she completed her Ph.D. work. It has been five years since that sabbatical leave, so at the time of her resignation, no further leave had been earned. Any request for compensation would have required an amendment to the Letter of Agreement, and no such request was ever put before the Board.

Letters of Agreement are a standard way for congregations and ministers to clearly state their expectations of each other and their obligations to each other, and they are a covenant to be honored by both sides. These Letters are used not only for full-time, settled ministers, but also for ministers that serve in a part-time, contract, or interim capacity. When we decide to make an offer to an interim minister, we will have an appropriate Letter of Agreement in place.

During the first round of interviewing, we spoke with five ministerial candidates. That round did not conclude with a match for us. We are now in the second round, which has not produced as many candidates interested in our area. We are working with the UUA to identify additional prospective candidates who might be a good match for our congregation during this transitional time.

This process is somewhat convoluted at times, but our intention and hope is always to be transparent and forthcoming with the information available to us. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to approach a member of the Board, who can either answer your question or direct you to a member of the search team who can.



Congratulations to our Community Minister, **Rev. Maggie Lovins,** who recently graduated from Starr King School for the Ministry in Berkeley, CA, with her Master of Arts in Social Change and a Certificate in Unitarian Universalism!

WAY Cool Sunday School in June!

<u>Welcome</u>, June! One Room Sunday School (ORSS) will begin June 10. This summer we will be drawing our lessons from "<u>Keepers of the Earth</u>" by Joseph Bruchac and Michael J. Caduto. This curriculum is an environmental classic that teaches children respect and stewardship for the Earth and all living things.

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Don't Pay Sales Tax!



Our many wonderful and dedicated volunteers often pick up needed supplies for various programs, to be reimbursed from a church account later. Thank you so much for doing this - it saves time and trouble for all of us. But, please note that as a religious organization, UUCP

does not pay sales tax! Here is how to make your purchase in a way that will save the church money:

- If you're ordering something online from a retailer like Amazon or Walmart.com, please just send a link to the item you want to Erin (uucptreasurer@gmail.com) to be ordered through our existing tax-exempt accounts. We can charge our church credit card directly and save you the out-of-pocket expense.
- If you're shopping at a local retailer, please get a copy of our certificate of tax exemption from Erin first. They are in the church office, or I can email one to you. The certificate can be presented to the cashier or sometimes at the customer service desk – at the time of the transaction.
- We already have tax-exempt accounts set up at several retailers around town; even if you get caught without a copy of the certificate, you can ask if we're already in their system.
- Even if you are paying for something with your own cash or credit card, please be sure to identify UUCP as the customer on any written or online order forms. If we are not identified as the customer, we cannot claim the exemption.
- A buck or two at the end of your receipt may not seem like much, but over the course of a fiscal year, it really adds up. Thank you for taking the time to save us the unnecessary expense.

SYNOPSIS OF ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

(FOR FULL MINUTES OF THE MEETING, SEE THE BOARD MINUTES BINDER IN THE CHURCH OFFICE.)

The UUCP Annual Congregational Meeting was held on Sunday, May 6, 2018. There were 53 members present of 113 members eligible to vote, which constituted a quorum.

The following reports were presented during the meeting:

Treasurer's Report on the church's financial position through 3rd Quarter, FY 2018

Charitable Trust

Safe Church Task Force, organized by the Board to consider ways to enhance safety within and around the church building

Interim Minister Task Force, in the process of interviewing prospective candidates for Interim Minister

President's Report, Year in Review

The following motions were considered during the meeting:

Motion: That the congregation accept the slate of candidates as presented. The motion passed unanimously by show of hands.

Motion: That the congregation adopt the budget for 2018-19 as presented. By show of hands, the votes for this motion were as follows: 0 abstentions, 51 in favor, and 1 opposed. The motion passed.

Motion: That Mike Huey be designated an Honorary Lifetime Member of UUCP. By anonymous ballot, the votes for this motion were as follows: 50 Yes, 0 No, and 2 Abstain. The motion passed.

Motion: That the following be added to the church bylaws: "Our congregation will allow proxy and/ or absentee voting at the discretion and direction of the Governing Board."

While the above motion was being discussed, concerns were raised about how proxy and/or absentee voting would be implemented, and it was suggested that the wording to be added to the church bylaws be modified. The following motion then was made and seconded.

Motion: That the motion to allow for proxy and/or absentee voting be tabled. By show of hands, the votes for this motion were as follows: 9 abstentions, 10 in favor, and 33 opposed. The motion did not pass.

Since the motion to table did not pass, members voted on the original motion to add the language to the bylaws. By anonymous ballot, the votes for the original motion bove were as follows: 42 Yes, 8 No, and 2 Abstain. The motion passed.

Motion: That UUCP confer the Rev. Dr. Julie Kain with the status Minister Emerita of UUCP. By anonymous ballot, the votes for this motion were as follows: 44 Yes, 5 No, and 3 Abstain. The motion passed.

Ballots were placed into a box and were counted after the meeting by President Kate Wolverton, Treasurer Erin Renfroe, and Secretary Lauren Anzaldo.
