

LUUNCH BUUNCH May 9



A 15% church donation from Boneheads requires 30 lunch diners (and other factors), so we'll stay more central for May 9's 2nd Wed., by going for Sake Cafe at 4880 N. 9th Ave. - the former site of the Pensacola Christian Science Church. I've just been inside: with hibachi on the far right, booths and 4 person tables on the left, and a 14 person semi-partitioned room on the immediate right, there is plenty of room in the comforting interior. Outside, with a fresh asphalt coating on the drive & parking, cooler tree-shaded parking is found deeper into the lot. Their phone is 494-9999 in case you need it, but mine is 478-2373 and call me by Monday the 7th if you want to make a reservation (or huturn@juno.com, also by Monday). ... Sake's on-line lunch menu should answer most questions (e.g., bento boxes), etc.

... Sake's 9th Ave. yellow sign lies just north of its entry way (to the east) and is perhaps 60 yards uphill from the south side of the 9th Ave./Carpenter Creek Bridge (Its exit lies about 10 yards north of the Creek Bridge, almost requiring a right turn toward Bayou Blvd. due the fast 9th Ave. traffic headed north.) The entry way is best approached from the south, but if you feel compelled to drive south on 9th and make a left turn across 45 mph traffic headed north, you can proceed further up 9th to a left turn lane for medical offices, and there make a return to 9th to head north; an option is to use the medical parking, in and to the lower/left side of that multi-office (large) parking, and step over a small curb to reach the Sake Cafe. As usual, we'll plan on our usual 1300 (1 PM) arrival. ... And FYI, Googling Christian Science Church/Pensacola still lists the Sake address, along with dated "talks" at Tryon Library, and a location (5555 Ste. D) near the Ichiban Restaurant on Davis Highway. Interesting; perhaps a lesson in "fading away" for small congregations.

Speaking of reservations, I did ask (you) for them pre-Tuscan Oven (across 9th and up the hill from Sake), got about 10, asked TO for 14, and we had 19 at a combination of tables. All successfully served, I'd judge, ... though personally, I'll have to say that a vegetarian pizza maker needs (brick oven or not) more expertise when adding artichoke that results in one bite/slice of "woody" chewing on vegetarian pizzas; TO needs to convey the sensation of more vegetables than bread on vegetarian pizza.

The UUCP Charitable Trust

WHAT IS THE UUCP CHARITABLE TRUST?

The UUCP Charitable Trust was established in 1988 with the purpose of receiving, investing, and disbursing funds for the long-term benefit of the UUCP congregation. Initially, the Trust was managed by dedicated volunteer members of the congregation but in 2009, the decision was made to seek professional management. At that time, the amount on deposit and invested was about \$159,800; however, with professional investment oversight, the current value of the trust invested funds as of December 2017 was about \$330,285. Since 2009, the annual Trust income from our investment has averaged 8.2%. Most of the funds are invested in the Permanent Endowment Fund, but the interest/dividends from these funds can be made available each year to the church's operating budget if needed. The vision is that as the Trust grows in value, the interest/dividends from our investment can be used to assist the UUCP congregation with unexpected expenses or "lean" years, essentially some perpetual income for UUCP.

There have been several instances since 1988 that the UUCP Charitable Trust has been invaluable to the UUCP congregation. One year right after the church roof was replaced, the Trust provided Wind Insurance for the church (cost was about \$11,000). Additionally, funds from the Trust were used to initially help with start-up funds for a full-time settled minister, and funds were made available to the church when our air conditioning units were stripped so that we didn't have an unbearably hot building that summer. And of course, we most probably would not have our wonderful building at 9888 Pensacola Boulevard if a Building Fund had not been initiated via the Trust investments. And most recently, funds were donated to the Trust by an anonymous donor over a few years to be held and invested so that the church could have a professional kitchen which hopefully will attract future building rentals for additional income for the church. These kitchen funds earned interest/dividends over the years which provided additional income for the Trust and hence the congregation.




Documentary: Before the Flood
