






Double Consciousness

After the Egyptian and Indian, the Greek and Roman, the Teuton and Mongolian, the Negro is a sort of seventh son, born with a veil, and gifted with second sight in this American world,--a world which yields him no true self consciousness, but only lets him see himself through the revelation of the other world. It is a peculiar sensation, this **double-consciousness**, this sense of always looking at one's self through the eyes of others, by measuring one's soul by the tape of a world that looks on in amused contempt and pity. One ever feels his two-ness,--an American, a Negro; two souls, two thoughts, two unrecognized strivings; two warring ideals in one dark body, whose dogged strength alone keeps it from being torn asunder.

The Double Bind

A double-bind game is a game with self-contradictory rules, a game doomed to perpetual self-frustration. The social double-bind game can be phrased in several ways:

The first rule of this game is that it's not a game. Everyone must play. You must love us. You must go on living. *Be yourself, <u>but play a consistent and acceptable role.</u>* Control yourself and be natural. Try to be sincere.

Essentially this game is a demand for spontaneous behavior. (Impossible!!)
