Originally from Southern California, Rev. Alice Syltie attended high school in Colombia, South America, before moving with her family to Alabama. She graduated from the University of Alabama and after serving the Unitarian Universalist Church of Birmingham as their Religious Education Director for 13 years, received her Master of Divinity from our Unitarian Universalist seminary, Meadville Lombard in Chicago. She was ordained by the Birmingham congregation in 2001 and called to serve as the settled Parish Minister in Huntsville, AL, in 2002.

In addition to her professional work, Rev. Alice has a long history of volunteer service to the UUA and the Southern Region. She served the Mid South District Board as Religious Education Chair, Youth Coordinator, and Healthy Congregation Consultant. As an ordained minister she accepted an appointment to the South Eastern Regional Subcommittee on Candidacy and is currently an active member of the South Eastern UU Minister's Association, where she has also held leadership positions.

Alice writes, "As someone who feels extremely lucky to have been raised in the Unitarian Universalist Church, I have always wished more people could discover the joy of our inclusive, life affirming faith. Growing Unitarian Universalism in the South has been my deepest calling. During my 16 years in Huntsville, I was richly blessed with opportunities for professional development including four years of study and travel with an Interfaith Clergy Group sponsored by the North Alabama Institute for Clergy Excellence, leadership in the Interfaith Mission service, including serving as the President of the Board of Directors, and over ten years of participation in a facilitated group for clergy studying Healthy Leadership through knowledge of Family Systems and Emotional Process theory."

Rev. Alice's husband, David, was from Mobile, Alabama. They were married 41 years, had two children, and two grandchildren. David died in January of 2014. 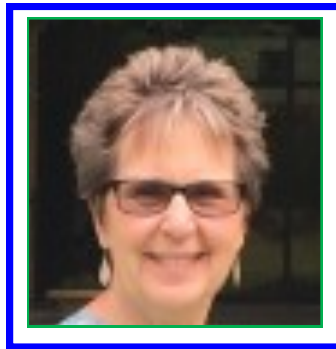
Our Congregation has always been a “Leadership” team reaching into the larger community. Leadership is about forward thinking, which often requires challenging the status quo. That is who we are.

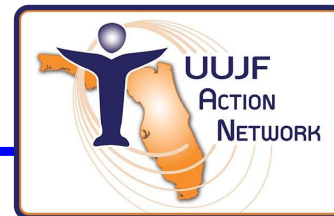

Our Fifth Sunday Share the Plate program

...is one way we work beyond our walls and share our UU values in our greater community.

In September the offering for the 5th Sunday will be shared with Floridians for a Fair Democracy for their Second Chances initiative. This is also called the Voting Restoration Amendment. Most Floridians believe in second chances, yet our laws and our executive branch deny 1.4 million Floridians the ability to vote. These 1.4 millions are Floridians who formerly were convicted of a felony (**not murder or sexual assault**), have served their sentences and successfully completed everything the courts assigned to them. Florida is one of only 4 states that permanently bar former felons from voting. Last year we at UUCP and in UU Justice Florida were part of the coalition to collect the petitions to put an amendment on the ballot. It was hard work but we collected the millions of signatures we needed. Now that the amendment will be on the November ballot we are in the final stages of this effort. We need to let the voters know how important it is to vote yes on Amendment 4. To do that they need to know what it is. And they need to know its importance. It is important for our safety, in that those with the ability to vote are less likely to commit further crimes. It is important for our economy; if these Floridians are able to get jobs and contribute, studies say that it will add \$365 million to Florida's economy annually. Certainly, August's "small event" at Taste of Jerusalem (707 North Pace Blvd, west side at Gadsden) was a series of pleasant gratuities ... for the 7 of us that experienced the atmospheric (M.E.) fan noises, etc. First, before orders were taken, small samples of the various veg. entrees, pickles and sauces were provided, then the pita for these "finger foods". Then, with our orders out (I recommend the kibbe), plenty of chilled water bottles, some to go. And finally finishing up, sizable two-3 bite pieces of Middle East sweets, gratis, not as over-sweet as I've experienced by most non-Mideast bakers of these desert sweets. Everyone was positive on the tastes and service.

Asa was born and raised in Pensacola, where he lives with his Mom, Debra Dubose, and her partner Pam Ubben. Family members also include his father, Lee, and sister Hannah. His best friends: "Nigel and Alexander."

About Pensacola as home, Asa says "It's too humid and too right-wing, but it's home. I don't know what I would do without all the water and green."

David Sanford, our fellow UUCP Member

UUCP member David Sanford, who has lived with a heart defect all his life, recently combined his health experiences and his observations of the world in a book of poetry, "If My Heart Could Talk & Other Poems."

And it did.

David was interviewed earlier this month by WEAR-TV news reporter Laura Hussey about his life and writings and the will to succeed, in an appearance shared with his mother, Monica Sanford. An interview on BLAB-TV is scheduled for later this month.

The TV-3 conversation was staged at University of West Florida, where David graduated with a degree in theatre. David's main priority is writing stories, poetry, and plays while occasionally appearing in theater productions. He lives in Pensacola with his mother, Monica, father, David L., and sister, Ruby Marciella Sanford.

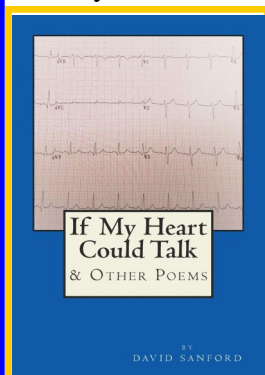
Asked to share a poem, David said his favorite was "Letter to Peter" – Peter being a nearly one-year-old boy, son of a co-worker of David's mother. Peter was also born with a heart defect. "It's the most personal poem to me; I also believe it gives off a universal message of anyone dealing with any adversities, that they can still achieve their goals in life," says David.

David read quotes from the first two stanzas: "God chose you to have a special heart, I know it may seem unfair, why does yours have to be different, but I promise you will be able to handle it.

"The scar on your chest is a symbol of your struggles, it shows your strength, it gives you character. God believes you can become the man you want to be, I want you to believe it too."

David's 113-page, self-published book is available on Amazon.

1. Bring items to the church beginning **Sunday, September 16th** or arrange to bring your items when someone is at the church during the week.
