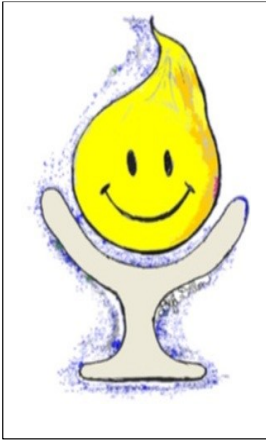
Reverend Alice's contract includes availability to meet with congregants by request. She is in Pensacola approximately 2 weeks a month.

SOCIAL JUSTICE NEWS

The Social Justice Team has bought a beautiful new table runner to use at Earth Day, Gay Pride events and other occasions when we have a table at an event for community outreach.

Many of our members have been very busy in the community. One important commitment involving many of our SJ members is the Equal Justice Initiative-sponsored Lynching Commemoration Ceremony, at Plaza Ferdinand in Pensacola where two lynchings occurred. This has involved collecting soil samples from the sites of lynchings in Escambia County in the late 19th and early 20th century. These soil samples have been divided, with part being displayed locally and part being sent to Montgomery, Alabama to be part of a display at the National Monument for Peace and Justice, which memorializes the struggles of black people and the terror they've suffered since they were brought here as slaves. In addition, in line with our Share the Plate offering on Sept. 30, we've been working hard on Amendment 4, with UU Justice FL and Second Chances Coalition featured in the article below; UUA President Susan Frederick-Gray will be here in our own state of Florida this month helping to spearhead this effort.

In October we will get back into full swing. We will meet on October 28th after the service in the Library at 11:15am. We need to discuss and divide up duties for our upcoming projects. Many thanks to Leslie Grill who has volunteered to keep our bulletin board updated. Also, look for time and date in October of documentary *"The Hunting Ground"* about campus rape. *Paula Montgomery*

Dear UU Clergy and Congregations in Florida,

As you all know, our UU values are at stake in the upcoming mid-term elections and this is especially true in Florida. **Not since the Voting Rights Act was passed in 1965 have we had an opportunity to expand voting rights to so many people. Over 1.4 million people with past convictions in Florida will be eligible to vote if Amendment 4 is passed.** Laws that stem from the Jim Crow era will be overturned and justice will be furthered. The political landscape will be impacted and realigned not just in Florida but nationwide. Getting out the vote for Amendment 4 can help turn out people who share our belief that no one is disposable and all are a commitment to democracy.

The UUA has joined UU Justice Florida and UU Florida congregations in the [Second Chances Coalition](#) to help get a win on Amendment 4.

UUA President Rev. Susan Frederick-Gray will be coming to Florida on the weekend of Oct. 19-21 to join canvassing efforts and phone banks and we hope you can join her and other UUs:

On Saturday, October 20th, where Rev. Frederick-Gray will be part of a short program at the UU Church of Sarasota, followed by training and canvassing, OR by watching the program on Facebook Live (we will be livestreaming from her Facebook page) and joining a canvass in your area.

On Sunday, Oct. 21st, Rev. Frederick-Gray will be preaching at the UU congregation in Clearwater at 10:30 a.m., then speaking on Facebook Live and phone banking. UUs from all around Florida and the country are invited to listen to our UUA President on Facebook Live and then join the phone bank from their congregations or on their own.

Together we UUs can do our part to help get this historic win in Florida. We could use one in these times and it is possible. A powerful spiritual antidote to discouragement is right action.

The UUA is also joining UU Justice Florida and other faith groups for a **Faith Day Phone Bank on Oct. 9th from 5:30-8:30 pm ET**. We are asking UUs nationwide to join. If you can join that day please sign up at <https://secondchancesfl.org/partner/uua/call/oct/>. After you sign up you will receive a short video to watch and written instructions. All you need is a phone for speaking and a laptop or tablet to read the script and record your results – the system does the dialing.

Thank you for all the work you are already doing. Please don't hesitate to contact me with questions and feedback. I look forward to seeing some of you in Florida for canvassing and to being on the phones together as we roll up our sleeves for the movement and renew our commitments and our covenants.

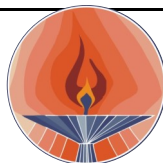
