HURRICANE MICHAEL RELIEF

How are UUs helping others to recover from this disaster? UU Justice Florida (UUJF) has been working for several years with a group called North Florida Resilience System, largely funded by grants, which has set up a communication network in central and south Florida and is now reaching to include us here in the Panhandle. They function on many different levels in areas of need after a disaster of any sort. They've set up a fast, flexible communication network to let people know what is going on and where.

North Florida Resilience System has many areas of expertise. They are deploying university students to identify people in need of services, collect data and spread information about where help is available. The data will be shared with agencies who provide help to improve future disaster responses.

The organization is mainly looking for those who are living in minority and immigrant neighborhoods. These residents are more likely to be overlooked by the larger agencies, or might be frightened to come forward, or might not know how to find help. They seek residents and communities in the areas affected by this disaster to find gaps or unequal outreach in services.

Since Pensacola did not suffer grave damage, we are in the network for future needs as well as current offerings. One significant offering helping those affected by Hurricane Michael is Tyson Foods' "Meals That Matter" mobile relief program, which deploys loaded trucks and teams to serve free, hot meals and ice, water and other food to anyone in need affected by weather catastrophes. Former UUCP member Brian Hansen helped with this effort, encouraging the quickest possible deployment of teams and on October 16th, Tyson began delivering food and water to the Walmart Supercenter in Panama City's Eastside suburb of Callaway, FL. We are all proud of Brian! We have also provided local networking with Movement for Change, the NAACP and others. The Auction items seemed to just "pop" up however; it was obvious there was lots of work including time, talent and many donations to make this possible...often the unknown and the silent voices of our community once again. Our community gathered to honor our beloved Paul Cutchen. We came together to make music and share stories of his life and the love of his family and his endearing wife, Billye Cutchen.

In October, our church provided a space (rental) for the voices of local candidates to discuss their views and present their proposals focused on important issues in our larger community. The forum allowed discourse on how to proceed to protect our beaches and waters from continued denigration, adding the sounds of the larger community into hallowed space. A time to listen and learn...

The Board members are listening. They have planned a Roundtable forum with the Team Leaders for Sunday, November 4th, 11:30-1 pm. We will gather to review the Long Range Plan, assess where we are in this process and identify areas of strength as well as focusing on our next steps in honoring our vision as a congregation.

Two proposals were submitted to the Board and were passed, to address fundraising opportunities for the Memorial Garden. Honoring those who have come before us helps to strengthen and to unite us in a unique way. Their visions have already laid a foundation for us...often when we listen, we can hear their reverberations.

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Getting to Know UUs—Hannelore Musial

Think Sunday Sweets, white Christmas stars and opera matinees.

But there's more to marvel in getting to know Hannelore Musial: her childhood in Germany during the Nazi regime, training as an interpreter, and employment as an au pair for a family in New Jersey. And meeting Victor.

Hannelore came to the United States in 1952, at the age of 24. "I had gone to school to become an interpreter and wanted to come for a year to learn the language. And during that time I met Victor in Connecticut through mutual friends and he decided to marry me."

Hannelore and Victor became members of our UU church in 1988. Hannelore will turn 90 on Nov. 8, observing the occasion in a modest family celebration in her home on Creighton Road, where Victor built all the furniture and Hannelore for years nurtured the landscape's blossoms.

At the time they met, Victor was working for American Cyanamid in Connecticut. He had come to the United States in 1951, as a Polish displaced person. "He came through a Polish organization here and didn't want to go back to Poland because of the Communists."

Victor spent the war years in Germany as a prisoner of war from Poland. He worked for a family of German gentleman farmers, having been given the choice of work or continuing imprisonment. He remained with the family from 1939 to 1945, and, notes Hannelore, "they stayed friends for the rest of their lives."

Hannelore and Victor moved to Pensacola when he was transferred to American Cyanamid's factory in Pace. Hannelore, happy to discover the Pensacola UU church, joined immediately. Although baptized Lutheran by her German family, she was influenced by Atheist/Freethinkers during the Nazi regime. Victor, however, was a bit more hesitant in becoming a UU, she recalls: "I would say, 'You should come; we have a good speaker,' and he would say 'bunch of crazies." But he eventually tried the UU and liked it, noting "It's better than any Catholic church," Hannelore remembers. And later, "He said it was the best thing he ever did." As for Hannelore, "I am proud to be a member of the church. The church has done a lot of good things."

Hannelore's parents, Emil and Lilli Bianchi, also moved to the United States, in 1958. "My mother died here and she's buried at Bay View Memorial Gardens. Then my father went back to Germany." Her father was in the shoe industry, cutting leather for designer shoes.

Among UUs, Hannelore is best known – and adored – for her Sunday Sweets confections. Her love of baking was early concocted. "My mother was a very good cook and baker and she made me make things when I was 9 or 10 years old. I baked Christmas cookies for my aunt, who didn't like to bake – and I just loved it. And Aunt would give me money for it." Variety and creativity are Hannelore's recipe for delicious results. "I like to try new things all the time. I get bored doing the same thing." Hannelore also has provided German dinners for eight as fundraisers that were auctioned off.

Hannelore's love of opera is also traced to her mother – who loved to sing opera and wanted to become an opera singer, a career choice frowned upon at that time by her parents. "So she took my brother and me to the opera since I was 8 or 9 years old. And she would sing the operas at home." Friends regularly now gather afternoons in Hannelore's parlor for favorite concerts.

Concerning social issues, such as social justice and reproductive rights, recalls Hannelore, "I supported everything." Among horrific tragedies close to UU concerns was the murder of James Barrett, a UUCP member, by an abortion protestor.


Meanwhile, Victor Musial was also becoming a staunch supporter, and a holiday hero, among UU friends – who were "star-struck." A skilled artist, Victor folded paper into stars each year for Christmas – hundreds of stars each year. "He started in June or July, every year," says Hannelore. "Victor would fold them and where pieces of paper were hanging out, I would have to trim them, and then thread them for hanging." The stars, in plentitude, were also available for sale for the church memorial garden. Victor passed in 2006; his artwork remains with us, as well as the bookcases and magazine racks that he built for our library at the church.

Hannelore and Victor had two sons, one who died a few years ago; the other, named Victor after his father, lives in Oregon. He will be here for his Mom's birthday. *By Charlotte Crane*

Before "Crowd Funding" was even a thing, the UU churches in the region were way ahead. The "Chalice Lighter" grant program began in 1984 as a way for people to be able to give a little and have their collective small gifts then make big impacts on churches in the region. UUCP has been the recipient of two such grants over the years, one to purchase the large sign on HWY 29 and another to purchase hymnals and develop our music program. Two current projects of Chalice Lighters are to help a small church purchase their first church building and another to help a congregation start a community garden.

Three (3) times a year a "call" (an email, really) goes out to people who have signed up to be a "Chalice Lighter" asking them to contribute \$10. It's a small but very effective way to extend our faith directly to other UU congregations. WOULD YOU LIKE TO LOWER YOUR TAXABLE INCOME????




If you are 70 ½ years or older and have savings from which you are required to take the minimum required distribution (MRD), consider paying your UUCP church pledge or donation to the UUCP Charitable Trust directly from your minimum required distribution as a tax-free transfer. Just have your financial institution make your pledge check or trust donation check directly payable to the church or Trust before they make the check for the remaining amount payable to you. Handling your donation in this fashion allows you to avoid counting these donations as part of your taxable income and therefore you pay no income taxes on these donations. However, the donations do count toward your required minimum distribution. You do NOT have to itemize deductions in order to benefit from this arrangement. For example, if you were to make a \$2000 donation to either the church or the Trust and you are in the 20% tax bracket, you normally would have to pay about \$400 in taxes on this donation or essentially have \$2400 in order to make a \$2000 donation. Since the donated amount is paid directly from your financial institution to your designated charity before you receive the remaining amount of your required minimum distribution, these donations do not become part of your adjusted gross income and are not subject to income taxes. Hence, you may be able to lower your tax bracket.

Thanks also to all the UU shoppers who together voluntarily spent over \$700 at the sale. We all found something to "recycle," "re-purpose," and "reuse." Not only do our yard sales help us recycle and de-clutter, they most certainly help low income shoppers with budget shopping. Charities also benefited from our sale—books and other media were donated to Open Books for Prisoners and the Milton Public Library, linens were donated to local animal shelters, and other unsold items were donated to Teen Challenge. And some items will be used by our UUCP church.


