Come join us for a service for all ages celebrating the Pagan holiday, Beltane, featuring an interactive play adapted from Circle Round story, "The Goddess Blesses All Forms of Love." While Beltane services traditionally focus on celebrating fertility and sacred unions, our service will honor all those who love and nurture others. We will also recognize the hard work and efforts of our CRE teachers.

May 19 "The Reason of Humanism—From the Dark Ages to the Present" UUCP Member Buz Ryland. Humanists believe that human experience and rational thinking provide the only source of both knowledge and a moral code to live by ... Humanism is a democratic and ethical life stance, which affirms that human beings have the right and responsibility to give meaning and shape to their own lives. Buz will speak on the history and modernity of the movement, and the local activities of the Humanists of West Florida.

May 26 "We Remember"

A moving part of the Sunday service at UUCP is the inclusion of We Remember, a time to recognize those whose lives were lost the previous week, in service to our country. While Memorial Day is often linked to the beginning of summer vacation, or a weekend for bargains, the sacrifice our citizens make for the values we claim to uphold does not come as a bargain. On this Sunday we will remember and honor the true meaning of the holiday, which, as the story goes, began as an expression of gratitude to Union soldiers by newly freed slaves in Charleston, South Carolina.

June 2 "Reason, Reverence and Awe"

Our June theme of Beauty brings to mind words like reverence and awe. Remembering one of my dear professors at Meadville Lombard Theological School, I added reason to the trinity. In his book, *Reason and Reverence: Religious Humanism for the 21st Century*, Rev. William Murry writes, "Since the beginning of recorded history, part of the religious impulse in humankind has been to be open to the mystery that lies in and around us and to respond to that mystery with feelings of reverence and astonishment." What we revere we typically want to protect. How might our feelings of reverence and astonishment inform our response to the ethical and moral dilemmas we encounter today?

From Our Minister, Rev. Alice Syltie

UU minister, Victoria Safford, speaks of curiosity using the metaphor of perception and sight. She writes,

"To see, simply to look and to see, is an ethical act and intentional choice; to see, with open eyes, is a spiritual practice and thus a risk, for it can open you to ways of knowing the world and loving it that will lead to inevitable consequences. The awakened eye is a conscious eye, a willful eye, and brave, because to see things as they are, each in its own truth, will make you very vulnerable."



In response, Rev. Scott Tayler writes:

"Consequences. I'm not sure I've ever thought of curiosity in terms of consequences. But I think Safford's got it right. There is a type of curiosity that is about enjoyment and adventure. It invites us to experience life as a playground. But there is another type of curiosity that leads to consequences, that changes us. This kind of curiosity is about more than enjoyment. Indeed, it's the kind that drives us *past* enjoyment and comfort. It's not about enriching oneself; it's about altering oneself."

Altering oneself can be a scary thought. We know, or at least we think we know, who we are now. To take steps that lead us into the unknown leaves us feeling vulnerable and insecure. And yet, how different our lives would be if we never stepped into the unknown, if we never took a risk. The risks in my life have been numerous. Marriage, deciding to have children, becoming a minister, moving to another city to answer a call to serve a congregation, were all life altering steps. When things don't turn out like I hope, I call it a growth experience and search for a beneficial life lesson. I've discovered that getting curious can be an antidote to suffering. It can also open doors to amazing and wonderful discoveries.

May is often the month that Unitarian Universalist Congregations begin to wrap up a church year, make some decisions about the coming church year, then take a little time for rest and renewal. Although we no longer close our churches for the summer, while ministers head to Cape Cod, something of that rhythm remains. This Sunday, UUCP will make some decisions about its future. I hope the choices open doors to amazing and wonderful discoveries.

May Lunch Bunch

For 8 May's 2nd Wednesday, we will revisit Joey Patti's Seafood Restaurant (610 South "C" Street, Ph: 434-3193/3187). It sits on the west border of the Patti complex (The Big Stars and Stripes), best approached via "C" St. (west side of Bell Steel), south off Main (after "A" St. if coming west on Main). JP's is fast seafood, not gourmet, where you might take your visiting cousins, not your

rich uncle. Yes, some feel that JP is all FRIED, but several cashiers advise otherwise that there are, besides the soups (seafood every day, and New England Clam on Wednesdays only) and the salads (one with grilled Salmon, and one with popcorn Shrimp, "crispy or boiled") there are usually two grilled dishes - Grilled Garlic Grouper, or lightly blackened Salmon. ... Prices range run from Dinners @ \$10.25+, Baskets \$7-11, and Sandwiches \$4.50 (Hamburger) to \$8 (Crab Burger).

As some of you may recall, or intuitively suspect, JP's is a booth type restaurant, minimum moving of furniture, so the best option is to ask for 2-3 booths at 4/@. Let me know if you're inclined to attend this "tourist aware" food experience. As usual, RSVP by Monday, May 6, to 478-2373 or <u>huturn@Juno.com</u>.

In the meantime, seven of us ventured out to LIVE (Garden & Colby, block west of Ever'man, north side) to experience mostly raw foods; we had 5 thumbs up and two "half-thumbs" (unaware that Gazpacho usually means cold

soup, but they were menu-ed under "soup", usually implying "hot" to most of us). Three of us enjoyed the lunch special, slightly warm chili (i.e., cooked beans?), with good flavors, and salad with creamy (cashew? and oil) dressing, very good. All in all, most of us would visit again. (Though the veggies are not certified organic, LIVE is intentional about buying from a particular place that consciously provides from non-chemical farmers Flora-Bama on Mobile Highway).

Denise Gunn says she has enjoyed all her jobs and learned a lot from each one. And that's so easy to recognize as she opens the chapters of her careers.

Denise retired in 2012 as a special agent with the FBI after 21 years, serving in Salt Lake City, Utah, for seven years and completing her FBI career in Mobile and Pensacola, moving to the region in the year 2000. Earlier, at age 19, she had enlisted in the U.S. Air Force, where she served for seven years. She also taught special education in public schools for two years.

She was born and raised in Northeastern Mississippi in a small town called Walnut – "about 1.5 hours from Tupelo, birthplace of Elvis" (she adds with a smile).

As a retiree today, Denise continues to work for the good of others. "I enjoy volunteering with various groups and agencies. I especially hold an affinity for women, children, and the marginalized. I enjoy researching, attending community events, reading, and volunteering at Favor House and Covenant Care on a regular basis."

Denise earned a B.A. degree in psychology from University of South Carolina in 1986, while in the Air Force, completing college studies begun in Mississippi, her home state. She moved to Pensacola in 2000, the year when she and her husband, Steve Weathersby, were married. They had met in Salt Lake City; he had transferred to Pensacola in 1999 and is retired from the U.S. Marshals Service.

"My husband and I love traveling and visiting family and friends in Utah and Idaho." The couple has four children between them, from previous marriages. "The two oldest are in Idaho and have five of our grand-children between them. The youngest is in Colorado in graduate school and the other one lives in Pensacola and has a 4.5-year-old son.

"Steve and I each moved our parents to Pensacola about 15 years ago. We continue to help care for both our moms and my special needs brother."

Denise spent most of her spiritual years as a member of Christian churches.

"I grew up in northern Mississippi and only knew Southern Baptist. I went through a period of Agnosticism in my twenties and returned to Christianity after having children. I was a member of Presbyterian and Methodist churches and later rejoined SBC when my kids became involved in a local church."

She researched and became interested in the Unitarian church after deciding to leave mainstream Christianity. "The precursor to making this decision was my daughter coming out as gay, my numerous questions about social justice and inequality, and the desire to find like-minded people wanting to make a difference in the world."

Celebrate Diversity Inspire Love

A Coalition Working for Justice

An Interfaith Justice Ministry has formed in the Pensacola area, and UUCP is taking steps to further our congregation's mission by joining in the coalition's justice work in our community. The coalition is a non-profit corporation that includes 19 local congregations of varied faith traditions, including Protestant, Catholic, Jewish, and Muslim. The local group is part of a national organization called DART that consists of local grassroots affiliates in communities around the country. By mobilizing members of the congregations that are a part of the local coalitions, these affiliates have seen success in campaigns such as improving public education and increasing access to health care, among other initiatives.

The group will conduct its work over a three-year cycle that includes the training of Justice Ministry Teams from member congregations. Trainings were scheduled April 29 and May 13, and UUCP expects to send delegates to participate. The teams then help conduct a listening process to learn about concerns in the community. Specific actions to take to address these concerns or issues then will be identified.

Among the expectations for membership in this local coalition are 1) to make a financial contribution to the group's operating budget, 2) to provide members for the Justice Ministry Teams, and 3) to mobilize members of our congregation to attend a justice rally in May 2020. UUCP's financial contribution to the group is currently slated to come out of the Social Justice Team's off-budget account. Where in the World is Rev. Maggie Lovins?

Does that phrase sound a little familiar? Maybe some of you, or some of your children, played that game or watched the TV show back in the early 90s; it is also a phrase one of my girlfriends uses with me when she's not sure of my (very diminished over the last few years) travel schedule. I tell people my community is the world and therefore I serve wherever I am needed. I thought before we move into the summertime I should update y'all with some of the comings and goings of your UUCP Community Minister and invite you into what is to come!

In January I was blessed to be invited back over to lay-led Bay County (Panama City) to give the Martin Luther King Jr. Day sermon. I was very excited about this as I planned to

marry MLK Jr.'s voice of inclusion to the Final Frontier of the original Star Trek and tell the tale of how a chance meeting changed Star Trek, Nichelle Nichols and Gene Rodenberry's trajectory forever. It was a great service. As I left from their small, beautiful house, now converted into their congregation's home, we noted that so much of the area was still nowhere close to recovering from Hurricane Michael. We promised to try to get our congregations to partner together more often, as they had recently by serving meals to the homeless.

In February I was invited to lead the Sunday service of the lay-led congregation known as Heartland UU in Zionsville, IN. This is the home congregation of my niece, Christina, and though I have accompanied her there several times this was my first time in their pulpit. It was also the first time a few of my family members were able to come to one of my services, making it even more special! That morning we talked about intersectionalities, how we run into too many roles demanding too much of our time and attention and how we might put some of those down to have better family and spiritual lives, changing our society in the process.

Many of you know Chad and I visit Costa Rica a couple of times a year when my health allows. We go to the southern Caribbean coast; it's a real melting pot, away from all the tourists but in a very poor area that still has a large indigenous population known as the BriBri. I have made friends with the couple who have run the local soup kitchen (for 16 years!) as well as providing school uniforms, backpacks, supplies and even tuition when available. Nancy and Barry are from the group Science of Mind <u>https://scienceofmind.com/10-core-concepts/ https://www.csl.org/en/</u> that has principles that align very closely with Unitarian Universalism. They have put their heart and soul into this work and I have vowed to assist them in their mission of helping these lovely people and their children as part of my ministry to the world. I will be collecting donations and supplies throughout the year at different locations and events around the area. I hope that UUCP and the caring people that call it home might wish to be a part of it at some time as well, but that is a discussion for another time! Pura Vida!

And the final thing I wish to share with y'all is that I will be leading a two-and-a-half day workshop at UUWomenspirit at The Mountain next month! I ask for prayers and good vibes for my health to hold out and for those Women who are taking my class to really get what they need out of it. If any of you ladies have never been, now is the time to come! Several of our members go once or twice a year (it's held in the late spring and again in mid-October) so car-pooling is usually available and there is usually a wonderful workshop being led by one of our talented UUCP members!


