#### **President's Column**

#### From the Board

Goals provide a target to focus on while motivating us to stretch beyond our current circumstances. The Governing Board sets goals each year to prioritize our work. The 2019-20 Board established three goals at our August retreat. The goals involve clarifying our present situation and setting a clear path for our future.



## Goal 1: Work with the congregation and with Rev. Alice Syltie to create a vision for the church's future that is aligned with our mission statement.

You may notice more explicit references to the UUCP Mission Statement in Sunday Services, in the newsletter, and in other communications. We want members of the congregation to be familiar with and proud of our mission. Our mission to Celebrate Diversity, Strive for Justice, and Inspire Love grounds our work today and provides a strong starting point for a vision of the future.

Related to this goal, Board members have been exploring our WHY and will share several exercises with the congregation. The WHY of UUCP will be considered at two after-service workshops, Oct 20 and 27, facilitated by Rev. Alice Syltie and Nancy Hagman, respectively. Also, the "Smalls Making a Big Difference" webinar will be broadcast at 6pm on Wed., Oct 16. We'll participate and learn together in the sanctuary.

## Goal 2: Increase the congregation's awareness of our current ministry situation, e.g. part-time contract consulting minister.

After many years with a full-time settled minister, having a part-time contract minister takes some getting used to. The reality is that we cannot afford a full-time minister with our current annual budget. Instead, we have contracted with Rev. Alice as a part-time consulting minister, which is different than an interim minister who would help prepare us for the process of searching for a new settled minister. Members may feel that Rev. Alice's time with us is temporary and/or infrequent. While everything in life is impermanent, Rev. Alice anticipates being with us a few years as she helps us navigate the work described in Goal 1. There is no set timeframe for a church's contract with a consulting minister. A second one-year contract was signed in August. Her agreement is to be in town about two weeks per month, 20 Sundays per year. She is available by phone or email much of the time even when she is not in the area. Members are welcome to review Rev. Alice's contract or to speak with a Board member for any questions about her ministry at UUCP.

#### Goal 3: Engage and support the Ministry Teams, including filling vacant Team Leader positions.

Ministry Teams require ongoing support to carry out all the amazing work they do in our congregation. All but one Ministry Team are covered right now. CRE needs a leader to work with our paid CRE Coordinator, Sarah Stubbs, in creating a meaningful program for our young people. The Ministry Team Roundtable on Sat., Oct. 26 will provide training and information for the teams while also connecting them with the UUCP Mission and long-range goals.

What goals do you envision for UUCP? I would love to hear your thoughts.

As a congregation, we celebrate each other's joys and do our best to lighten the load of each other's sorrows.

If you've wondered why you weren't seeing much of UU-member Bob Gerold this summer, there's a reason – 7,200 miles in six weeks through 12 states, in a Winnebago Travato camper van, a Henry David Thoreau-type reflective quest with a Walden Pond savor.

The purpose of the trip? "To get away from screens, electronics and social media — and to be with myself at least temporarily," says Bob. "I had lost touch with myself." While still dependent on media for navigation and places to stay, "that's not the same as to be in a place where there is no television." Which he was.

Among trip highlights: national parks — Badlands, Glacier, Yellowstone, Grand Tetons, with Glacier topping his ranking for the trip's best scenery. Among weather extremes: severe thunderstorms in Missouri and sighting of thousands of flooded acres, mostly farmland, in Iowa. A family highlight was spending two weeks with his daughter, Aimee, in June in Missoula, Montana, where she is working as a technical expert at Cath Lab, owned by Abbott Labs. Aimee received her degree in biomedical engineering from Georgia Tech last December.

Bob's "Big Trip" — in which he visited Alabama, Mississippi, Tennessee, Arkansas, Iowa, Nebraska, South Dakota, Wyoming, Montana, Colorado, Kansas and Missouri — wasn't his only solo trip this year, however. Among others: California in January, which was followed by four-day trips each to Alabama, Mississippi, Georgia, and Apalachicola in Florida, prior to the biggest road venture. Bob's last major stop on the Big Trip was outside the Leavenworth, Kansas prison, where he spoke at a conference sponsored by Life Connections Program, — sponsors who had heard that he had written his book, "Things to do While You're Waiting," designed to help prisoners find a better life after release, rather than while away time without purpose. He plans to publish a new book to aid former prisoners, titled "Life Skills for Staying out of Jail."

Ever find a synchronous firefly — or a thousand or two? The Gerolds — Bob and wife Alice — did in June, on one of his "between trips" this summer. The synchronous fireflies are found in only four places in the world, relates Bob, one of them being the Smoky Mountains in eastern U.S — and they gather only over a twoweek period. Synchronous fireflies are able to synchronize their light patterns as part of the mating ritual, which only 1% of the world's fireflies are able to do.

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Patti Underwood is taking a brief break from being out-and-about while her right hand recovers from thumb surgery. The September 19 outpatient operation was to insert a bridge in the thumb due to osteoarthritis. She had similar surgery on her left thumb a few years ago. Patti expects to be back in church in a couple weeks. Do send a card!

Joyce Smandra has relocated to The Veranda at 6982 Pine Forest Road, 32526, Apartment 118. Reason for the move from her Royce Street apartment, says Joyce — with a dollop of humor — "because I could not find a wife to cook and clean for me." 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#### Welcome, New Member - Arnie Ondis

Arnie Ondis began his college focus in Fine Art, but soon found himself cutting classes to volunteer at a sheltered workshop for intellectually and developmentally challenged adults. And that set the pace for a lifetime career, devoted to providing psychiatric care, physical rehabilitation and case management for patients.

Born in Rhode Island but a full-time Pensacolian since 1977, Arnie has a bachelor of science degree in occupational therapy from the University of Florida and a master of science in management from Troy University; he's also taken master's level courses in interdisciplinary humanities at University of West Florida.

He began his professional career in Trenton, N.J., at the New Jersey State Hospital, the oldest public psychiatric hospital in New Jersey and the first founded by Unitarian social activist Dorothea Dix. "This gave me the opportunity to work with different psychiatric populations, including forensic, at the time when deinstitutionalization and mainstreaming of the mentally ill began."

The last 25 years of his varied professional career in health care were spent in nursing home operations.

Arnie was born the youngest of three children of first-generation American parents, who moved their family to South Florida when he was 5. He's the sole survivor of his original family.

He and his wife, Colleen, met at the University of Florida and are celebrating their 45<sup>th</sup> anniversary this year. Their move to our Florida corner from the Philadelphia area was motivated by the opportunity to help start up the Rehabilitation Institute of West Florida.

"The Rehab Institute was founded by members of the community who realized that a rehabilitation facility was needed – and they made it happen. We had planned to be here only a year or two as a stepping-stone in returning to South Florida, but fell in love with the area and decided to make it our home." Their daughter, Casey, also lives in the NW Florida area, with her husband.

Arnie and Colleen's happy planting here hardly means that they're stay-at-homes; they've visited in Europe, Colombia, French Polynesia, New Zealand and Australia, and look forward to future adventures.

Arnie, at home, might be found reading, kayaking, walking, watching Gator sports or NY Yankees baseball, doing yard work or attending community events; he's a member of ACLU and NAACP.

His religious foundation began with attendance at Catholic parochial schools through high school; most adult years were spent in the Episcopal Church. For the past few years, however, he had been without a faith community – until recently.

"I have been aware of UUCP and its visibility in the community for many years. The more that I researched and studied about Unitarian Universalism the more I realized that I have been in synch with the Seven Principles for most of my life."


Another influence for Arnie has been The URANTIA Book, introduced to him by a mentor some 50 years ago. "I established a URANTIA Book study group in Pensacola in 2004 that continues to the present." (And might it comprise another topic of conversation for eager UUs?)!

Meanwhile, Arnie Ondis has found a welcome home at UUCP. "Now that I have retired from full-time employment, I need to be in community with like-minded people as I map out the direction of my life.

I look forward to making new friends, developing relationships and serving together to make our greater community and the world a better place."

Lunch Bunch, we'll respond to several requests (and positive review or two) to try Kingfisher (formerly Slips), at 1500 Barrancas (2+ blocks southwest from the light at Garden, on the right), 432-1119. Its web site starts with Sandwiches (\$8 up) and salads (\$7), goes on to Soups (\$3 & 4), Platters (\$9 up) and Sides (\$3) (prices disclosed on Doordash.com). ... K's front room seating is booths & high stools/ elevated tables, but more conventional in the back, I was informed by the fellow who assured me that 12 or so should work in at their usually busy 1 PM time. ... As usual we'll plan to be ordering about 1:00, and save a place for you if you advise your intentions to <a href="https://huturn@juno.com">huturn@juno.com</a> or 501-5142. (Reservations run about 60%.)

For 11/9's (Sept.) Lunch Bunch, 13 of us convened at Thai Dishes (6245 No. Davis). When we first 3 arrived, one non-eater was alone awaiting his takeout. By the time 3-5 more of us arrived, the impression was strong with me that though there was a Reserved plaque on two tables with 6 chairs (I had asked for 10-12), this was a one-man shop both waitering and cooking. Fortunately, he did have help "in the kitchen", and though his drink delivery and order taking gave way to several groups of one-two which came in, we began to leave around 2:30. ... The decor is quietly attractive and the music a bit "old fashioned" but somehow fitting. As last served, my usual slow eating didn't hamper any one's departure (I don't think) since the manner of payment was not obvious.

After a small but basic salad with tasty non-oily dressing, the dishes came out in one or twos, steamy, no one suggesting unpleasant "hot" seasoning. With a coconut milk base, my tofu/rice/carrot/onion and potato was almost sweet to the taste; I'll try the ginger dish next time. ... And relating back to August, there were several at La Trattoria who did not join us. Could their hot spice/herbal fears been answered and avoided, if requested; probably so.

The Sixth Principle of Unitarian Universalism is "The goal of world community with peace, liberty and justice for all." Have you ever felt helplessness, frustration, anger or sorrow after listening to the news? When you see and hear the latest injustices perpetuated upon our fellow humans, do you despair at the knowledge that you, alone, can do nothing to bring justice to these people or these situations?

Welcome to JUST PENSACOLA (formerly the Pensacola Area Interfaith Justice Ministry).
