FROM YOUR MINISTER

My dear congregation, while physically we may not be in close proximity, you are in my thoughts at all times. Some of us have been connected by phone, email, text, or Zoom numerous times over the last few months. Others of you may have been holding back, waiting for things to return to normal. In March, when we first began to learn of the pandemic, I was sure this was going to be something we endured for a few months, before resuming the life we had known. Even so, there was much to learn to keep us connected in whatever ways were possible. As the weeks went on, we began to realize we were learning things that might be an advantage even when things did return to normal. For example, there will always be some people for whom getting to church or to meetings may be a hardship. And just think about the savings on time and gas when some meetings are on Zoom. A few of us have had crash courses in ten or fifteen years worth of technology. Hopefully, it serves us in the future, as well.

After that crush of learning, I was delighted that Laura Keith King and her daughter, Stephanie, came on board to help. I took some time to explore virtual opportunities for social engagement and continuing education. Currently I am enrolled in a course for ministers on leading in a liminal time. Although not created for this Covid-19 time, the theory applies directly to our current situation. The instructor, Susan Beaumont, has tailored the course to address the many issues facing us, as we navigate the societal changes brought to light during this pandemic. A liminal season, she explains, is a time “when something has ended but a new thing is not yet ready to begin.” In liminality, she continues, “there is a yearning to either go backwards to something that felt more stable or to leap forward to something that feels more resolved.” My hope is that we will use this time to engage in a true process of discernment, as we create a vision of who we are and who we want to be in a world that is rapidly changing. I look forward to us doing this work together.

The COVID-19 pandemic and its reverberations has shaken our world and our nation in so many ways, but UUCP perseveres. Yet there is no doubt that the virus has dramatically altered our church along with our workplaces, schools, relationships, the economy, and on and on. Infection rates in Florida and the inherent risks of virus transmission continue to be too high for us to gather safely. However, the Board and our Safer Congregations Ministry Team are researching, considering, and discussing possibilities for recongregating. In fact, we will distribute a survey in September to solicit your thoughts and priorities regarding gathering.

As suggested by this goal, COVID-19 presents us with opportunities as well as challenges. For example, the virus forced many of us to learn to use technologies we might not have otherwise. We surely will continue to utilize services such as Zoom and YouTube to communicate with our Members and Friends as well as broader audiences. And we will think differently about hygiene, air quality, and virus transmission for a long time to come. The Board is contemplating all this as we make decisions about recongregating in ways that will not only sustain our church but also strengthen UUCP in the long term.

Goal 2: *Work with the congregation and with Rev. Alice Syltie to create a vision for the church's future that is aligned with our mission statement.*

This goal may seem familiar because we have carried it over from last year. Over the last year, we've made a concerted effort to emphasize and highlight our UUCP Mission Statement. Hopefully, you've gotten to the point where the words Celebrate Diversity, Strive for Justice, and Inspire Love roll easily off your tongue and resonate with your spirit. You will continue to hear and see the Mission Statement featured in Sunday Services, in the newsletter, and in other communications. We want Members and Friends of the congregation to be familiar with and proud of our mission.

Those of you who participated in one of the workshops that Rev. Alice and Nancy Hagman facilitated in Fall 2019 may recognize the Golden Circle displayed here. Using the terminology of the Golden Circle promoted by Simon Sinek, our Mission Statement reflects the WHY of our church. The statement illustrates why we exist, the driving force of our church. Our church covenant describes HOW we live our mission in relationship with one another and with the larger world.

A Vision Statement paints an image of WHAT we aspire to be as a church. The ongoing pandemic and the resulting period of social distancing has a pale silver lining in that it has provided us all with an opportunity to clarify what is most important to us. Strange as it may seem, this transitional period offers us a chance to envision WHAT we want for our church as we cross the threshold between not meeting together physically and eventually recongregating, in whatever forms recongregation takes. The Board hopes to work with the congregation and with Rev. Alice to develop a Vision Statement that clearly depicts our aspirations.

Goal 3: *Develop a Long-Range Plan that will guide us through the next five years.*

The Long-Range Plan that we created in 2015 reads like a long list of accomplishments. We have installed a new sign, embraced social media, established an Our Whole Lives (OWL) sexuality education program, added a beautiful chalice mosaic on the outside of our building, and achieved many more of the plans and goals presented in our current Long-Range Plan. We should be very proud of all we have done!

Now we are in need of a new plan to guide and inspire us through the next five years. As mentioned above, the current moment is actually a great time to work on such a plan. Being in a threshold moment, we can be creative with our goals.

We will need lots of input and help to craft a well-rounded Long-Range Plan that reflects the diverse aspirations of our congregation. Your voice is needed on this project and so many others underway at UUCP. I can't wait to tackle the challenges and opportunities with you this year!

What's in a name? More than most of us probably knew when Emma Mulvaney shared in last month's Light some of the Pandemic's effect on her family -- Emma, husband Mike and their 9-year-old daughter Maeve. Yes! Is the passionate response of Pam Levitt, who has homeschooled her daughter, Valerie, 10, and son William, 7, since preschool. "We have never attended brick and mortar schools." She has an M.S. Ed in Psychology in Education, and has worked in higher education. "Working with college students was one factor among many of why we chose to homeschool our children. We wanted more opportunities for child-led, interest-driven experiences for our children at a younger age, to help them form their interests and identities in a very different way and allow them to explore possibilities for themselves" – and long before having to decide a college and major.

The Levitt home school is secular and eclectic. They study World History and U.S. History, Language Arts, Poetics, Art, Math, and Science. Both children play the violin. By state requirement, the Levitts report to a private umbrella school to record attendance.

Now, as reasonably expected, homeschooling during the time of virus is growing. Pam has worked with a group of other homeschoolers to form a co-op called SHIP, "Secular Homeschoolers In the Panhandle," among about 10 other families, including three from UUCP, who are opting for home-schooling. They get together, virtually. "This semester we will gather for various offerings including Art, Poetry and Writing, Show and Tell, Virtual Board Games and a science course on Fresh and Marine Water." How do we strive for justice?



JUST PENSACOLA

The big question is “What keeps you up at night?” To learn the answers to this question, UUCP House Meetings will be held again in October and November. We need volunteers to host these meetings, which will be held via Zoom. Training for hosting, recording notes and timekeeping will be held soon, so watch your email for the date and time. We truly need everyone’s help to create a more JUST Pensacola.

Twelve members and friends from UUCP attended the JUST Pensacola Rally on August 10th for a total of about 200 local attendees. By the time of this publication the Nehemiah Action Assembly will have occurred. I hope many of you were able to attend virtually and bring at least 3 others to participate. Below are the findings of the research which led to the determination of the “asks” which the JUST Pensacola strategy teams formulated to present at the Nehemiah Action Assembly to encourage change in our community.

EDUCATION

Out of 3,000 Children entering school in 2017, 1,500 were not ready. In 2018 less than 46% of Escambia County’s children entering kindergarten were considered kindergarten- ready (research from Achieve Escambia/UWF Hass Center).

Escambia County ranks 53rd (out of 67 counties) in kindergarten readiness (research from the Studer Institute). Of those children who attend Voluntary Pre-K, only 56% are ready for kindergarten by the end of the program.

Our Ask: We will be asking Bruce Watson from the Early Learning Coalition for a 10% improvement in the number of children ready for kindergarten in 2021. We will ask ELC to staff accordingly in order to assess program standards and to provide a self-assessment tool to centers by January 2021 to be completed twice a year. We suggest that the monitoring team work in conjunction with providers in setting goals based on these assessments.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE

On August 31, we will ask the State Attorney-Elect, Ginger Bowden Madden, to commit to:

- Increasing the use of civil citations in Escambia County from 46% to 80%.
- Allowing our youth more than one opportunity to use civil citations.
- **Reconvening** the Civil Citations Committee that is supposed to meet every year to evaluate and encourage the use of civil citations (but has not met since 2016).

Since several Florida counties have successfully implemented the use of civil citations with adults for non-violent misdemeanors, we will ask that an exploratory committee be convened for Escambia County to develop a plan to implement adult civil citations.

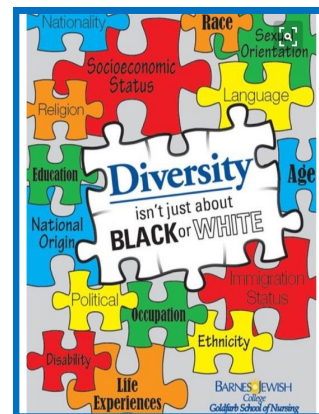

REPORT BY THE UUA: WIDENING THE CIRCLE OF CONCERN

A report prepared by the UUA Commission on Institutional Change provides findings and recommendations for addressing systemic bias and oppression within the UU denomination. The commission was formed in 2017 after leaders of color identified major problems within the denomination. The commission was charged with “supporting long-term cultural and institutional change that redeems the essential premise and ideals of Unitarian Universalism.” The release of the Widening the Circle of Concern report affords our congregation the opportunity to study, reflect, and act with commitment, humility, and empathy to make lasting change.
