
#### FROM YOUR MINISTER

Our Soul Matters Theme for December is Stillness. Our question to ponder is:

What Does It Mean To Be A People of Stillness?

Don't tell me to be calm when there are so many reasons to be angry...
I didn't say to be calm, said the wind, I said to breathe.
We're going to need a lot of air to make this hurricane together.

- Rev. Lynn Unger, from her poem Breathe



As Unger suggests, we don't really want to be told to be calm these days. There is indeed so much to be angry about. So much that needs defended, resisted and restored. Which means that there's a lot at stake in how we talk and think about stillness. A stillness that invites us simply to escape the world is dangerous. A stillness that merely anesthetizes our nerves comforts us but widens the wounds of the world. To listen deeply to our troubled times is to hear a call to challenge the view that stillness is the resting place at the bottom of the hill we've climbed and instead imagine it as the basecamp that launches us into the long trek up the mountain.

And alongside this vision of stillness enabling us to gather strength also sits the equally important idea of stillness as something that clarifies our perception.

One of the most powerful and heart-breaking examples of this comes from the movie Schindler's List. In what is possibly its <u>most famous scene</u>, Oscar Schindler is sitting still upon his horse at the top of a hill looking down at atrocities being committed by the Nazi soldiers. Up until that moment, Schindler couldn't see past his rationalizations. But in that still moment, which was filmed in black and white, we watch through his eyes and see one small burst of red emerging from the sea of gray. It's a single small girl in a bright red coat. In that moment his perception is transformed and the stillness allows him to notice that which calls him back to his humanity.

So friends, stillness does this too. It allows us to perceive that which is truly precious. And in doing so, it calls us back to our humanity.

When we pause and find that sacred point of balance, that which is precious in life lights up as if in neon. The blur that usually dominates our attention fades to gray and we are able to notice that which truly deserves our focus. Our care. Our commitment. Our love.

And when we are surrounded by and connected to those precious things, a type of magic happens. We suddenly know ourselves anew. We suddenly feel at home in ourselves and the world. That sense of home can calm us or it may challenge us, but either way life comes alive again.

So home, maybe that is the true aim of this month. Maybe stillness is not an end but a means. Maybe it is not the destination but the road. The road that leads us home.

#### FROM YOUR BOARD: PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

Sometimes what seems impossible is entirely — amazingly and inspiringly — possible. This message of possibility is one of the messages of the documentary "We Still Live Here: Âs Nutayuneân," which tells the story of the restoration of the Native American Wampanoag language. Centuries after the Wampanoag people survived the arrival of the Pilgrims



to New England, there were no native speakers of the Wampanoag language. Then an exceptional member of that tribe, Jessie Little Doe Baird, developed a program to bring back the language of her ancestors. Expert linguists acknowledge that the revival of a dead language like Wampanoag seemed impossible until Jessie joined with other Wampanoag people to reclaim the language that was so central to their culture. Stories of hope and possibility and resilience like this are like miracles in our world and are worth paying attention to and marveling over for the inspiration and strength they can bring us.

The film "We Still Live Here" was featured as part of the Harvest the Power Justice Convergence and Teach-In presented in late November by the UUA, UU Service Committee (UUSC), and UU Ministry for Earth. The Harvest the Power convergence was offered in an effort to further the UU commitment to learn our history and rethink Thanksgiving in the year 2020, which is the 400th anniversary of the Pilgrims landing in Plymouth. The event provided presentations, discussions, and film screenings to ground, inform, and strengthen UU justice and equity work. Also presented during the event was the important film "The Condor and the Eagle," which was scheduled to be screened here in Pensacola in Spring 2020 but had to be cancelled as we became aware of the COVID virus.

Speaking of COVID, the Board is reviewing the recongregation survey results from our Members and Friends as well as UUA recommendations and is considering how and when to safely gather in person. However, just as the Board began to look at these things, infection numbers skyrocketed to the point that the virus is more prevalent now than when we first closed the church building earlier this year. We are hopeful that news of immunizations and other measures will bring better days in Spring 2021 and safer conditions for in-person events.

December is the final month in what has been an unusual year. Many of us have been joking for months about wanting this year to come to an end. However, we know that many of the issues we have encountered this year will not evaporate with 2021. Still, a new year and new calendar does seem to bring the feel of a fresh start. Here are some of the exciting and worthwhile things the Board and others are working on for the coming year.

#### Strategic Plan

The Strategic Plan Committee is planning events and activities to collect congregational input for updating our strategic plan. Goals related to our Mission Statement and a UUCP Vision Statement are expected to be part of the new Strategic Plan. Committee members are Carol Trotter (Co-Chair) and Linda Cobb (Co-Chair and Board Representative), Jack Comstock (Board Rep), Barbara Goggins, Emma Mulvaney, and Bradley Vinson.

#### **Midyear Congregational Meeting**

Our annual midyear meeting is scheduled at 12:30pm on Sunday, Jan. 24, and will be virtual with Zoom log-in and call-in info to be distributed closer to that date. We encourage all Members and Friends to attend the congregational meeting. Reports on our finances, strategic plan, recongregation plan, and the work of our Ministry Teams will be presented.

I am looking forward to our continued walk together in 2021.

Emery's Mom is Linda's daughter, Alyssa, and her Dad is Justin Weyand. A foursome of UU friends cooked lunch and honored Hannelore Musial on her 92<sup>nd</sup> birthday, celebrated November 8<sup>th</sup>. The get-together crew gathering at her home consisted of Linda Cobb, Jack Comstock, Michael Newcomb and Hedwig Anderson. "Michael Newcomb made the cake and it was delicious," recalled Linda. "I think he called it a Million Dollar Pound cake." Besides the birthday lunch, Hannelore says she received "lots of cards and calls," all appreciated.

Hannelore and her husband Victor joined UUCP in 1988. Hannelore came to this country in 1952 to further her career as an interpreter after spending her childhood in Germany during the Nazi regime. She met Victor, who came to the United States as a Polish displaced person in 1951 and was then working for American Cyanamid in Connecticut, and they married. They later moved to Pensacola when he was transferred to American Cyanamid in Pace; he died in 2006.

Both Victor and Hannelore are known among UUs for their artistry. Victor built bookcases and magazine racks for the church library and furniture for their home. Hannelore is treasured for her delicious desserts, savored with delight during our traditional (pre-pandemic) UUCP Sunday Sweets.

A sunny day for Bill Sloan might involve working to convert a cottage in his backyard to a two-bedroom house, reading a passage from UUA's "Singing the Living Tradition," or reminiscing with best friend Scott Satterwhite about a rally they organized for Veterans for Peace – or fishing.

Almost certainly fishing – especially if it's Sunday, possibly explaining why he's not in church (when church was holding live services). Still, despite the river's lure almost always in play, he maintains he has found much to love about the Unitarian Church; indeed, he recently signed up as an official UUCP Friend after years as an "old friend."

Bill first heard of the Unitarian religion in the late 1950s when he was at Georgia Tech. Later, in Annapolis, MD, he became an irregular member of a UU congregation and "got to know that UUs weren't much interested in going to heaven. And the UU principle of action on 'liberal' causes reinforced what I already felt, and did not leave me."

Support of liberal causes spurred participation through several decades. He took part in the antiwar movement, for example as part of the Washington rally in 1968, where 250,000 assembled on the Mall. Later, in Pensacola, he and Scott formed VFP-Pensacola in 2002 and held many demonstrations to oppose the Iraq assault. And UUCP's former minister Rev. Bob Eddy asked him to speak at church on opposing the

threat to bomb Iran. Bill had served in the Army from 1959 to 1962.

Before Bill's formal UU Friendship, there was another religious tie: "Somewhere around 1972 a marriage got me happily engaged with the Episcopal Church for many years – for the fellowship, the music and the regular Eucharist." Recently a dispute with a local Episcopal leader, possibly over his political activities, caused a split, and his "solid relationship" with UUCP began.

"I am feeling free now. I no longer have to recite words I have not believed for many decades, Virgin birth, Resurrection, to name two." And recalling a conversation with a younger Christian one earlier day, he says, "I didn't mention that the Ten Commandments reach back into early Mideast religions that predate the Hebrew scripture."

Bill and his then-partner Sharon arrived in Pensacola in 1999. He lives at 1613 E. Jordan St., where he's building that small house, "expecting my daughter to live there one day." He also has two sons. He likes parties and reading. And he loves fishing.

A couple Sundays ago, Bill said he and his boat partner would be departing for Pensacola Pass about seven a.m. – hoping for another good catch. "Last Sunday we pulled in fifteen trout and snapper, by now mostly eaten, some frozen ... there will be more and bigger. I'll invite someone soon to help eat.

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#### Safer Congregation Team RECONGREGATION UPDATE

The Safer Congregation Team has been working toward getting all the pieces in place that will ensure the personal safety of one and all as we continue to move forward toward physical recongregation.

Thanks to the special efforts of Linda Cobb and Marcy Moreland we were able to produce the survey that has been sent to all UUCP Members and Friends, soliciting your feedback on what is important to you as we plan recongregating. Thank you for responding; however, if this got past you somehow, we still want to hear from you!

We continue to focus on air quality in our building. Basically, that has to do with the volume of air that is circulated and replaced within certain time frames, clearing out any possible aerosolized viral contagion. We are improving air flow in our restrooms by installing louvered vents in the doors for inflow and larger exhaust fans for outflow. We continue the process of evaluating our main air handling and researching possible filtration options.

Recognizing that there are some necessary small gatherings at the building, for example, work teams following the hurricane and volunteers for the auction, we have adapted a COVID-19 Screen for individuals who wish to participate in such activities and developed practices for this Preliminary Phase of our Phased Recongregation Plan. If you have a need that requires you to be at the building, please contact the Safer Congregation Team Leader, Arnie Ondis, and you will be provided with the necessary information.

We are all in this together and want nothing more than to be able to execute our mission, physically together, and as safely as possible. If you have any questions, concerns or ideas, please let us know.

#### REQUIRED MINIMUM DISTRIBUTIONS A LITTLE DIFFERENT THIS YEAR

Normally, this is the time of year we would remind people who are 70.5 years or older that you can donate to UUCP or to the UUCP Charitable Trust via a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) from their Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) without paying any tax on that donation.

The way the QCD usually works: You direct your financial institution to send the donated funds directly to the church or Trust before any remaining amounts are sent to you. That way, the donated funds never hit your bank account and are therefore not counted as part of your taxable income. You do not have to itemize deductions to benefit from this arrangement. For example, if you were to make a \$2000 donation to either the Church or the Trust and you are in the 20% tax bracket, you normally would have to pay about \$400 in taxes on this donation or essentially have \$2,400 in order to make a \$2,000 donation. With the donated monies never entering your taxable income stream, you may even lower your tax bracket.

What's different this year: The CARES Act passed in response to the Covid-19 pandemic includes waiving the RMD for this year. See this article by the IRS (https://www.irs.gov/newsroom/irs-seniors-retirees-not-required -to-take-distributions-from-retirement-accounts-this-year-under-new-law).

What does that mean? While there is no "money I have to withdraw anyway, might as well use it to pay my pledge and get some tax benefit" situation this year, there may still be some benefit to using a QCD from your IRA - it depends on your situation. For example, using the QCD will reduce the balance in your IRA and possibly reduce next year's Required Minimum Distribution. Please consult with your financial advisor to see what benefits you might still get from this option in 2020.
