Services Resume Indoors on July 4th: What to Expect

Indoor Services resume starting July 4th. The Best Practices, as outlined in the Recongregation Plan Phase II: Indoor Gatherings, will be observed. Here is what you can expect.

<u>Upon Entering</u>: Review the COVID-19 Screen and, if you answer "yes" to any of the questions, you should return home and contact your health care provider. You will notice signage regarding face mask requirements and other vital information. The greeters will be able to assist you with any questions you may have.

Face Masks: If you are fully vaccinated, face masks are not required but are optional. If you are unvaccinated or medically compromised, face masks are required. Face masks are also required for children aged 2 to 12 years (presumably unvaccinated).

Social Distancing: Distancing is not necessary for fully vaccinated persons. If you are unvaccinated or medically compromised, it is your responsibility to maintain a safe distance from others. However, opportunities will be available for safe distancing, and you may wear a sticker that will help everyone maintain that space. Those stickers will be available at the greeting table. If you require safe distancing while using the restrooms, ensure that it is vacant, and then use the slide bolt on the inside of the door.

Choir and Congregational Singing: Face masks are required for unvaccinated individuals.

Food and Beverage Service: There are no restrictions, but congestion should be reduced in smaller spaces.

<u>Children and Youth</u>: Childcare will be available, but no regular Sunday School classes will take place. Children aged 2 to 12, presumably unvaccinated, must wear a mask per CDC guidelines. Our childcare provider will be masked, and disposable children's masks will be available. Children may begin to gather in the Rainforest Room at 9:45 a.m. Virtual summer activities will continue alternate Sundays via Zoom.

Sanitation: General sanitation applies, and hand sanitizer will be available.

Unitarian Universalist Church of Pensacola Recongregation Plan

Phase II: Indoor Gatherings

<u>Rationale</u>

The Unitarian Universalist Church of Pensacola is committed to providing for the safety and wellness of its members, friends and guests while meeting its mission to celebrate diversity, strive for justice and inspire love.

This Phase II: Indoor Gatherings supersedes the restrictions of the previous plan's phases and complies with recent (May 2021) CDC guidance, and the desire of church membership to resume indoor gatherings.

Best Practices

The UUCP Governing Board may upgrade or downgrade the following best practices to comply with local public health advisories.

Per CDC guidance, *fully vaccinated* people may now resume pre-pandemic activities, including gathering indoors, without wearing a mask or practicing social distancing. While opportunities will be provided for social distancing for unvaccinated or compromised individuals, they are responsible for maintaining distance and observing any other applicable health guidelines.

Facilities: All UUCP facilities are open for use. Restroom exhaust fans will operate while the building is occupied by more than six people.

Capacity: No restrictions.

Face Masks: Not required, but optional, for fully vaccinated individuals. Unvaccinated and compromised adults, and children age 2 to 12 years (presumably unvaccinated) must wear masks.

Social distancing: Not required for fully vaccinated individuals.

Choir and congregational singing: Face masks and social distancing required for unvaccinated individuals.

CRE: Follows guidelines for face masks and social distancing for unvaccinated children.

Food and beverage service: No restrictions, but attempts should be made to reduce congestion in smaller spaces.

Sanitation: General sanitation should resume on a regular schedule.

How do we celebrate diversity?



Unitarian Universalism honors diversity of genders and gendered experiences. We are a <u>welcoming</u> faith. Unitarian Universalism doesn't just open its doors to people of all sexual orientations and gender identities—we value diversity of sexuality and gender and see this diversity as a profound spiritual gift. The following information can help you and your congregation increase your welcome and inclusion of transgender people, basic definitions, and further resources. You can read more from the UUA <u>here</u>.

From the Membership Team – Let's Put UUCP's Mission Statement into Action to:

celebrate diversity, strive for justice, and inspire love

We recognize and celebrate the many facets of the human spirit among ourselves and in the larger community.

You can demonstrate your support of inclusion within our UUCP congregation by:

- Updating your name tag by adding your pronouns. Pre-printed stickers will be available on the table just outside the Library.
- Updating your Simple Church profile page with just a few easy steps. The simplest way to do this is by using the phone app. Use the "Edit Profile" button on your opening page. Then, in the area for First Name, type in your first name, and then, in parenthesis, your pronouns.

You May Have Questions

What is a gender pronoun?

In English, gender pronouns are gender identifiers for the third-person singular. In the past, gender pronouns were separated into masculine (*he/him/his*) and feminine (*she/her/hers*). This separation of masculine and feminine is called gender binary and only recognizes men and women. Many people identify outside of the gender binary. Gender-neutral pronouns such as they/them or xe/xer/xers allow individuals to use pronouns ... [that] fit with their identities.

Why do pronouns matter?

Pronouns, like personal names, are connected to a person's identity. Just as we can show respect by calling others by their correct name(s), we can show respect by using the correct pronouns. Using the wrong pronoun can make a person uncomfortable and possibly invalidated or alienated.

A person's name or physical appearance do not necessarily indicate their gender so we should not make gender assumptions based on these.

An Opportunity to Memorialize Non-UUCP Members

If you would like to memorialize a loved one who was not a member of our UUCP congregation, consider purchasing a memorial nameplate that will be displayed in the Memorial Garden. The nameplates are 2" x 6" and made of a durable, weather-resistant material. Included on the name plate will be the deceased's first and last name, their birth year and death year. The cost is \$50 per person to be memorialized.

Although there is no deadline for purchasing a memorial, consider doing so by mid-September so that they can be on display for Day of the Dead.

JUST Pensacola

Congratulations UUCP! We were recognized at the JUST Pensacola Celebration for have 86% of our usual Sunday attendance present at the Nehemiah Action on May 3rd. Well done! This demonstrates in a very tangible way, our dedication to Justice in our local community.

The Celebration meeting on June 14th was to review our success in the last cycle of action and to get us ready for the next cycle.

This fall we will begin again with small house meetings to review what justice issues are troubling us in Pensacola. From the summary of concerns, we will again select two issues to research and finally to take action on during the next Nehemiah Action in the spring. Based on our success in getting the attention of our officials this year for Civil Citations, I have a strong feeling that going forward we will gather even more attention and action for justice.

Meanwhile the organization that holds us together so that our voices will be heard has to have money. There are rents and salaries to pay as well as printing, electronic usage (think Zoom) and other incidental expenses. Our congregation voted to support JUST Pensacola. The UUCP board acted in accord with our vote and has pledged to contribute 0.6% of our budget (\$850). The JUST Pensacola organization also suggests that each of us commit to an individual donation in an amount you are comfortable with. A number of the individual members of UUCP have already made that commitment to donate for our success. The suggested amount is \$200. Your pledge can be paid all at once or in installments.
