

Harsh words or a lost focus? I think the latter.

Throughout the ups and downs and twists and turns of this pandemic, UUCP leadership has taken its roles and responsibilities for the safety and wellbeing of our congregants very seriously. The needs of our Members and Friends during this time have been the central factor driving the Governing Board and Ministry Teams.

We have relied on guidance from the UUA and local public health authorities. We have been true to our values of protecting the most vulnerable among us and leaving no one behind. And we have recognized that physical protection can cause loneliness and despair.

We have kept moving forward, adjusting to the demands of an ever-changing landscape. Most recently, the Board has approved vaccination mandates for invited speakers, employees, and contractors/vendors.

What is different now from the first time we recongregated is the increased transmission risk of the Delta variant, and the passage of time. The data have shown that full vaccination immunity diminishes over time and the question of what constitutes full vaccination arises with the advent of the third booster. This is something that the CDC has announced that it will tackle soon. If you are eligible, get that third booster when it is available to you!

We've all been responsible to one another, but the piece that has been lost in all of this, in my opinion, is the personal responsibility that we have to ourselves. COVID is becoming endemic and will be with us for a long time in one form or another. There can never be a one-size-fits-all Recongregation policy. While trying to meet the most needs, it is not possible to meet every need. But you have been given tools (information and data) and participation options (in-person, live stream, YouTube Channel, Zoom meetings) to make the most informed decisions for yourself, and you have been empowered to speak up for yourself in preserving the physical space, or other accommodations, that you may need.

- 3. Select your charity in this case Unitarian Universalist Church of Pensacola.
- Start shopping! Remember to checkout at smile.amazon.com to generate donations to UUCP. Tip: Add a book mark to make it easier to shop at AmazonSmile.

How to use AmazonSmile using the Amazon app on your mobile phone:

- 1. Open the Amazon Shopping app.
- 2. Navigate to the main menu (=).
- 3. Tap on Settings and then select "AmazonSmile."
- 4. Select Unitarian Universalist Church of Pensacola and then follow the on-screen instructions to turn ON AmazonSmile in the mobile app.

5. Once AmazonSmile has been activated in your app, future eligible app purchases will generate a donation for the church. Note: The tablet app is not yet supported. Please visit <u>amazon.com/onthego</u>to learn more.

HOW MUCH OF MY PURCHASE WILL UUCP RECEIVE? Once you've chosen the church, anything that you buy on the Smile site will include a donation of 0.5% of your purchase. The donation is made through the AmazonSmile Foundation, which is a 501(c)(3) private foundation created by Amazon.

DOES THE SHOPPER NEED TO BE A MEMBER OR FRIEND OR EVEN HAVE ATTENDED UUCP? Nope, anyone can designate the church as their recipient of their donation. Think about asking your friends and relatives to consider.

Happy Days Are Here Again: In-Person Services Resume at UUCP

Due to the COVID transmission rate dropping below 5%, we will resume full operations beginning Sunday, October 31st, including the Coffee Hour. Unvaccinated persons <u>must</u> wear masks; fully vaccinated persons are <u>strongly encouraged</u> to wear masks except while eating or drinking.

Vaccinated choir members may sing without masks at the front of the church, but people in the audience must wear masks while singing.

Facility rentals will be considered on a case by case basis until further notice.

A reminder that while we are resuming in-person services and refreshments in response to the Escambia County Covid transmission rate falling below 5%, our covenant calls for us to help those who choose to attend our services who may need the rest of us to continue masking and social distancing even if we are vaccinated. Please:

Respond to those needs when they are expressed, especially when you're unmasked to eat or

drink.
