


## Dec 5 "The Season of Lights" with Rev. Alice Syltie

# Dolly's SCARS TO STARS, Mystical Humanist UU, A Mini Memoir


Dolly Berthelot, a member since 1984, has a new book being published this month. The mini memoir focuses on her ethical spiritual personal growth from Catholicism through Existentialism to what she calls Mystical Humanist Unitarian Universalist and beyond. Through honest stories, timely essays, and original yet accessible poetry, she illustrates what that mouthful means to her and how each aspect has been practically useful. Her insights lead naturally toward both independence and interdependence, and the Common Good to

which we all must aspire, especially in this Pandemic Era. While some statements like, "God is irrelevant to me," will surely be controversial to many, a careful, open-minded read will show much common ground across belief systems.

UU and UUCP are prominent in the little book, which can be useful for newer members and

potential members as well as others who might simply like to understand more about this creedless religion or her version of humanism and mysticism. Dolly also touches on her meandering, sometimes controversial, professional life and her personal life, as well as her nuanced philosophy. SCARS to STARS moves from a college crisis through world travel and child rearing and end of life caretaking. The latter will be explored much more deeply in IMPERFECT LOVE, a longer memoir expected out next year, also to be published by Energion.

This 72-page *SCARS to STARS* paperback sells for \$10 through Energion Publishing or from Dolly.





#### **CHARITABLE DONATIONS FOR 2021**



**From the Treasurer:** 2021 giving statements will be sent out in January. Please ensure all charitable donations you wish to be credited to the 2021 tax year are made by December 31. If you would like to see where you are, let Erin Renfroe know, and she can send you a preliminary statement to review. Our preference is to send statements via email, so please make sure your email address is correct in Simple Church. Thank you!

#### REQUIRED MINIMUM DISTRIBUTIONS A LITTLE DIFFERENT THIS YEAR

Normally, this is the time of year we would remind people who are 70.5 years or older that you can donate to UUCP or to the UUCP Charitable Trust via a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) from their Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) without paying any tax on that donation.

The way the QCD usually works: You direct your financial institution to send the donated funds directly to the church or Trust before any remaining amounts are sent to you. That way, the donated funds never hit your bank account and are therefore not counted as part of your taxable income. You do not have to itemize deductions to benefit from this arrangement. For example, if you were to make a \$2000 donation to either the Church or the Trust and you are in the 20% tax bracket, you normally would have to pay about \$400 in taxes on this donation or essentially <a href="https://paper.com/haves/h

What is the UUCP Charitable Trust? Just as our IRAs provide us with personal financial stability in times of need, so the UUCP Charitable Trust provides our church financial stability when unexpected or unforeseen expenses occur.


## J.U.S.T. Pensacola's Research Kick Off—IN PERSON
