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From Our Minister

Our Soul Matters Theme for March is Renewing Faith. To me, this theme goes well with the spring season. Knowing that brighter and warmer days are soon to come, is always a hopeful and renewing time for me. I like being outside and I don't like to be cold. While we continue to watch the number of Covid infections decrease, the warmer weather offers



opportunities to feel safer gathering in groups, especially for those who are at higher risk of infection.

Connecting with one another became the highest priority during the last two years. While being together in person is most people's preference, we have learned that opportunities to gather online or on Zoom expand access to community. I hope we continue to offer these opportunities. While it took a while to get used to, and some people might be ready to toss their computer off a cliff, I think it is a valuable resource for involving people who, for any number of reasons, find connecting from home a better option. The increasing cost of gas has just been added to my list of good reasons to meet online.

Before the pandemic, I started two groups of Theme Circles. Theme Circles are created for contemplating and sharing our thoughts on the Theme of the month. A packet of readings, resources, and questions designed to open further exploration of the theme is distributed to participants each month. Themes are chosen to be broad enough to engage for a month and to allow flexibility with sermon topics. The themes take the cycle of the church year into account.

Prior to Covid, Theme Circles met at the church and there were 22 people participating. The quick switch to online did not work for everyone. We have kept one group going, and from my perspective, the conversations have been deep and meaningful. As we move into a new season, I would like to encourage you to consider trying this way of deepening your knowledge of yourself and others. A couple of expressed goals of the program are to deepen our theological literacy and build community. If you are participating in the discussion of Thomas Moore's book, "A Religion of One's Own," you may find this a good way to augment or continue your exploration. I am considering options for meeting at church, as well as meeting online. I think this opens up more opportunities for participation.

For right now, I would like to offer Zoom opportunities in March for people to see what Theme Circles are all about. No long-term commitment would be requested. I will also work with our church schedule to see when a new group at church would be possible. If you are willing to give this a try, it would be enormously helpful to know if daytime or evening is important for you. An email to me or to Terra, at the church office, would be a great way for me to gather that information.

I hope you will consider this invitation to experience our Theme of the Month, Renewing Faith, with your comrades of the spirit.

March is Trust Month!

By recent proclamation, the Governing Board of UUCP and the Trustees of the UUCP Charitable Trust declared that March of every year will henceforth be recognized to honor and promote awareness of our Trust.

What is the UUCP Charitable Trust?

It's a legal entity separate from the church – founded March 22, 1988 by Ken Bullivant, Don Danly, and Barbara Goggins – for the purpose of receiving and investing funds for the long-term support of UUCP (then PUUF).

How does the Trust help the church?

All donations go into the principal of the Trust (the Permanent Endowment), which is meant to remain intact in perpetuity. Income from the corpus (the Accessible Endowment) is available for use by the church when needed. The Building Fund provides loans to the church for repairs or improvements to the building and grounds.


Why would I donate to the Trust?

Donations to the church fund the day-to-day operating expenses – the minister, utility bills, paid staff, music, etc. Donations to the Trust help ensure the financial stability of the church for the long haul. When you donate to the Trust, your donation works for the church for years and decades to come.

Donate to the Trust to honor a church member or loved one, to celebrate special occasions, or just to be a part of the church's future in the community. You can also provide for the Trust in your estate planning. (See a Trustee for help doing this.)

The Trust is celebrating its 34th birthday this March, so we celebrate our church forbears who had the vision to create it, and all those who have donated to the future of UUCP.

Arthur Edouard de Tonnancourt

Arthur Edouard de Tonnancourt, USN Cdr. (Ret.), age 90 of Pensacola, died Monday, February 7th at his home after a short illness. Arthur was born on January 7, 1932, to Antonio de Tonnancourt and Orea Lamoureaux in West Warwick, Rhode Island. He graduated from Rhode Island College of Education then entered flight training with the US Navy, earning his wings in 1953. He served as Commanding Officer of VT -1 Training Command, 1969-70, and afterward obtained his Master's Degree in International Affairs from the Naval War College at George Washington University in Newport, Rhode Island. He served four years with NATO overseas, retiring in Pensacola in 1977.

Among his many interests and accomplishments were his passions for fly fishing and soaring - piloting glider planes well into his 80's. He is survived by his wife, Linda, his four children, 13 grandchildren, 13 greatgrandchildren, and many friends in his Fly Fishing Club and Glider Club. He loved the ocean and his family. He will be sorely missed by all.

We would like each of you who signed up to be a JUST network member at a house meeting to attend our Network Meeting March 13th. At this meeting you will receive the research teams' updates on Affordable Housing, Civil Citations for Juveniles and Civil Citations for Adults. We will also be sure that each UUCP member is invited to the Pep Rally and the Nehemiah Assembly Action and encouraged to invite 8 people to these events. Let's fill Wahoo Stadium on May 2, 2022.

Monday March 28 at 6 pm Pep Rally (location to be announced)

At this event we will learn what the research teams have determined to be significant, winnable 'asks' from public officials to improve the use of Civil Citations for Juveniles and Adults. We will hear what JUST Pensacola will ask of officials to make significant progress against the Affordable Housing Crisis. These teams have had numerous meetings with people from different organizations to determine exactly who and what can make an impact on the issues. We may hear testimonies from people whose lives have been affected by these issues.

Monday May 2 at 6 pm at Wahoo Stadium (Woo! Hoo!)

It's been 2 years since we have had a Nehemiah Assembly in person. **This is it people!** Finally, we can bring out 1,200 or more people to impress our stockholders that we mean business. We will ask our public officials to make policies and take actions that can and will make a dent in the Affordable Housing Crisis and significantly increase the use of Civil Citations. We want Pensacola to do much better and be a better place to live for all its residents.

Thoughts on Entertainment from Hugh Ed

I read in the WSJ that Netflix and Amazon and AMC, etc. are up and down stock market-wise in their efforts to satisfy those who pursue their entertainment needs from those sources. Being frugally blessed by no electronic connections to the entertainment world, my main source of small screen "engagement" comes via air signal, from which I receive all the big four (ABC, NBC, CBS and PBS), and many more, nice and clear from an inside antenna.

Though spending most of my time with PBS (5 channels), and some nights, CBS (5 channels), between 7 and 9 PM I have often found stimulation and satisfaction on 35.3 with "Quantum Leap". The lead actor, for those who don't recall the 1989 to 1993, 5 seasons, is Scott Bakula, the same NCIS New Orleans chief, now a bit on the skinny side, and sometimes, I think, a role not requiring the range that he achieved on QL. To remind those old enough to recall, the science-fiction stories had him leaping into the life of a character who was facing some sort of life challenge—such as a supersonic test pilot, as a mother whose oldest daughter was finding women's lib in the 60-70's, or a black man/ chauffer much in the position of Morgan Freeman in "Driving Ms. Daisy."
