

## October 23rd "Wills: Do They Help Carry Out Our Last Wishes?" Presented by Dr. Paula Montgomery, a lifelong member of our congregation


Perhaps we all want our last wishes carried out. Does a will do that for us and if so, which type of will?

## Crys Brockway (they, them, their) and Their Son James Brockway



Crys moved to Pensacola in April of 2020 when their mom became sick and needed help. They moved from Decatur, Illinois where they had lived for 10 years with their children. While they love Pensacola's beaches and wonderful weather, they have also met some of the most amazing people here!

Crys was born and raised in Rockford, Illinois where they attended Auburn High School & Rock Valley College. They started classes for their CNA, (Certified Nurse Assistant) license in their senior year of high school and went straight to work right out of high school first as a caregiver, then as a CNA when they passed the state exams at 18. Crys is currently enrolled at Fortis Institute in the RN, (Registered Nurse) program. Classes start October 3rd.

They have worked for the last 21 years as a caregiver/CNA and became interested in caregiving when their grandmother had a stroke and needed help at home. They have worked in the healthcare field in many different areas including hospital positions in ER, med/surg, and oncology, nursing homes and recovery centers, and homecare and dementia/Alzheimer's care.

Crys is currently working in homecare for Comfort Keepers as a Dementia Specialist CNA and plans to work in Dementia care when they complete their RN training. They love taking care of people and knowing that they are making a difference in others' lives. Helping and listening to those who are at their most vulnerable gives Crys purpose.

Crys has 3 sons: Eddy will be 18 on Dec 30, James (who is also a member) will be 17 on Mar 16, and Keaghan will be 13 on May 8. They have a large chosen family in the queer community and Crys considers their friends at the UUCP to be their chosen family and dearest friends.

They have many interests and hobbies. Among them are reading, writing/journaling, art, swimming, hiking, biking, photography, animal rescue, advocacy and social justice, Wiccan education, Paganism, and religious exploration.

Crys' life for the last 12 years has been an adventure. Their husband and the father of their children became addicted to drugs and overdosed in February 2010 while they were 6 months pregnant with their youngest son. This nearly impossible situation has given Crys the strength to get through the past 12 years and has made them a stronger, kinder, more compassionate, and more caring person.

They grew up in a Fundamentalist Christian family who did not live out their faith. At the young age of 14, they started exploring other religions and searching for what fit with their belief system. Six years ago, they found the UU Church of Pensacola. They were drawn to UUCP because of its inclusivity of all religions, sexual orientations, and gender identities. They were a member of the UU Fellowship of Decatur in Decatur, Illinois, and looked for a UU fellowship here in Pensacola immediately upon arrival.

They love that everyone at UUCP made them feel welcome, accepted, and included from the first moment they came in.

## October – a Time to Celebrate LGBTQIA+ History



LGBTQ+ History Month is observed in October. As we situate our current moment in the greater arc of history, it may be helpful to reflect on the many accomplishments as well as challenges that mark LGBTQ+ history in our nation. One website dedicated to the LGBTQ Rights Movement in American history identified the era from 1975-2000 as the "Conservative Resurgence." The years from 2000-2020, meanwhile, were identified as "The 21st Century Transformation" era. However, since at least 2015, there has been a new conservative resurgence that has turned back many of the achievements in LGBTQ rights that came earlier.

To us as UUs, these efforts to restrict the rights and liberties of LGBTQ+ persons present an affront to our faith and our affirmation of the inherent worth and dignity of all people. As stated by the Unitarian Universalist Association

(UUA) in regard to LGBTQ+ equity, "[W]e value diversity of sexuality and gender and see it as a spiritual gift. We create inclusive religious communities and work for LGBTQ justice and equity as a core part of who we are." May that be true for us during the month of October and every day.

1977 – Anita Bryant leads campaign against Dade County, Florida, ordinance *preventing* discrimination against homosexuals, which was then repealed.

1977 – Harvey Milk, elected county supervisor in San Francisco and becomes the third "out" elected public official in the United States. Milk was assassinated on Nov. 27, 1978.

1978 (June 25) – In San Francisco, the Rainbow Flag is first flown during the Gay Freedom Parade.

1979 – National March on Washington for Lesbian and Gay Rights. Over 100,000 people gathered in support of gay and lesbian rights.

1979 – Chapters of the national organization of Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG) are founded across the United States.

1981 (June 5) – AIDS Epidemic begins.

1985 – Rock Hudson dies. He was a leading actor in many movies in the 1950s and 1960s. He died of complications related to AIDS. After his death, it was revealed that he was gay and had several male relationships.

1985 – The AIDS Quilt concept was conceived and implemented by Cleve Jones, an LGBT activist in San Francisco.

1987 – The organization, ACT UP formed in New York. The purpose of ACT UP was to impact the lives of people living with AIDS, to advocate for legislation, medical research, and treatment, and to bring an end to the disease. The organization is still active today.

1988 (Dec. 1) – The World Health Organization (WHO) declared December 1 as the first World AIDS Day.

1993 – The U.S. Congress passed, and President Bill Clinton signed "Don't Ask Don't Tell" that allowed gay and lesbian people to serve in the military. They would not be asked their sexual orientation during enlistment screening.

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1994 – Greg Louganis, four-time Olympic gold medalist and considered one of the greatest divers in history, publicly came out as gay as part of the Gay Games in New York City.

1997 – Ellen DeGeneres, a comedian, TV actor and television host, was one of the first popular entertainers who publicly came out as a lesbian.

1998 – Matthew Shepard, a 21-year-old student at the University of Wyoming, was brutally attacked and tied to a fence in a field outside of Laramie, Wyo. and left to die because he was gay. He died from his wounds several days later. This was one of the most notorious anti-gay hate crimes in America and resulted in a federal law passed 10 years later in 2009 called the "Hate Crimes Prevention Act", a federal law against bias crimes directed at lesbian, gay, bisexual, or transgender people.

2008 (November) – Proposition 8 passes with a 52% yes vote in California declaring that marriage is between a man and a woman.

2010 – The U.S. Congress passed, and President Barack Obama signed the repeal of "Don't Ask Don't Tell" so that gay and lesbian people could serve openly in the military.

2013 – U.S. v. Windsor / Repeal of the Defense of Marriage Act – DOMA (Supreme Court Decision)

2015 – Obergefell v. Hodges (Supreme Court Decision): The Court voted 5-4 that the fundamental right to marry is guaranteed to same-sex couples by both the Due Process Clause and the Equal Protection Clause of the Fourteenth Amendment of the U.S. Constitution. This decision mandated that states must allow same-sex couples to legally marry.

2016 (March) – A North Carolina bill that became known as "the bathroom bill" thrusts the state, the topic of gender-neutral bathrooms, and transgender issues into the national spotlight.

2016 (June 12) – 49 people are killed, and 53 are wounded in a shooting at Pulse, a nightclub in Orlando, FL, frequented by members of the LGBTQ+ community.

2016: There were 41 openly gay, lesbian, or bisexual athletes in the Olympic Games in Rio de Janeiro. This is the highest amount the Olympics games have ever seen.

2016: *Moonlight* is one of the first movies from a major Hollywood studio to deal with gay romance. Set in Miami, the film is directed by Barry Jenkins, who graduated from FSU Film School in Tallahassee, FL.

2017 (July 26): President Donald Trump announces a ban on transgender people serving openly in the military, reversing a protection issued earlier by President Barack Obama in June 2016 and later reinstated by President Joe Biden after he came into office in January 2021.

2021 (October) – Admiral Rachel Levin, the first openly transgender four-star officer, is sworn in to lead the United States Public Health Service Commissioned Corps.

2022 – A historic number of anti-LGBTQ bills are passed in states and municipalities across the nation. 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# **UUCP FALL YARD SALE: FRIDAY, OCTOBER 21<sup>st</sup>**& SATURDAY, OCTOBER 22<sup>nd</sup>

Many of you have asked "WHEN" is the next Yard Sale? It is finally happening in October!!! Do your "Cleaning Out" NOW while the heat index is too high to be outside. Don't wait until the week of the sale as we won't have time to get your items priced and hence these items will go unsold.

- 1. Bring items to the church beginning Sunday, October 2<sup>nd</sup> (not before please) or arrange to bring your items with someone who has a church key during the week. Remember we don't currently have an Office Administrator presence at the church during the week. Kitchen items, linens, toys, children's books, outdoor items, furniture, electronics, shoes, purses, hats, knickknacks, tools, jewelry, pictures, collectibles, appliances, gardening supplies, and pet items are all good sellers. Items can be placed in the back hallway away from the exit doors. Putting items in stackable boxes would be a "big help."
- 2. Bring us your portable folding tables by Sunday, October 16<sup>th</sup>. Be sure your name is underneath the tabletop. Tables can be picked up on Sunday, October 23<sup>rd</sup>. We always need more display tables!
- 3. Because there are so many tasks associated with planning and coordinating our Yard Sales, we are asking that you make arrangements with other church members/friends to pick up and deliver your large or heavy items to the church ahead of the sale. We need these items no later than Sunday, October 16<sup>th</sup> or Monday, October 17<sup>th</sup> to include them in the sale. Thanks for understanding.
- **4.** Plan to **stay after church Sunday, October 16<sup>th</sup>** to help with initial set up. Help is needed to set up some long tables and to bring items from storage to the church foyer. Just an hour would help a lot.
- 5. <u>Volunteer to help</u> with set up and pricing of items on Monday, October 17<sup>th</sup>, Tuesday, October 18<sup>th</sup>, and Wednesday, October 19<sup>th</sup> beginning at 9:00 a.m. (until about 4:00 p.m.) –any shift during these times will be appreciated. Contact Linda Cobb with days/times you can help. A sandwich lunch will be provided. Other food donations appreciated. We need lots of helpers just to organize items so they will sell better. No expertise required. Remember volunteer helpers find the "early bargains." We may also work Thursday, October 20<sup>th</sup> if not done on Wednesday.
- **6.** Volunteer to help with the actual sale on **Friday, Oct. 21**<sup>st</sup> and **Saturday, October 22**<sup>nd</sup>. Any shift you can work between 7:30 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. would be great. ### A Note from Thom Botsford:

### 'I am boycotting the UUA—but not the UUCP'

Fellow members and friends, I did not renew my membership in the Unitarian Universalist Association this spring because of the way our denomination has treated dissenting voices over the past few years. The case of the Rev. Todd F. Eklof of the Spokane UU Church is especially troubling.

It has taken a while for me to run down pertinent details, but our denomination basically "excommunicated" a heretic despite its commitment to "the free and responsible search for truth and meaning" (Fourth Principle) and the right of conscience (Fifth Principle).

Eklof, the minister of a church historically committed to religious humanism, was shocked when he was upbraided for distributing a book critical of the UUA:

"It is difficult to imagine that [more than 125 years after the Spokane church's founding] I would be excommunicated from the community of Unitarian Universalist ministers for writing and freely distributing a book of dissenting essays at the UUA's 2019 General Assembly," he wrote.

"Although I expected some backlash, given that such backlash was essentially what I was writing about, I could not have imagined how explosive my little book [*The Gadfly Papers*] would become only a few short hours after I began giving it away to members of this venerable tradition, the most liberal religion in human history, who barely had time to read past its cover."

Eklof managed to hand out fewer than 200 of the 750 copies he had planned to give away before being confronted by five members of the UUA Assembly's so-called Right Relations Team. Before the day was over, he had been expelled from the assembly.

"During the following twelve months," he noted, "I would be publicly condemned by hundreds of my colleagues, fired without cause or explanation as an adjunct professor at Meadville-Lombard Theological school, censured by the UU Ministers' Association, learn that top leaders in the UUA had conspired with some in my own congregation to help remove me from my post, and, finally, have my professional credentials removed by the UUA's Ministerial Fellowship Community—excommunicated from the professional community of my peers...."

I know some of you will wonder about my motivation and have some questions:

What does all this have to do with me? Why be so concerned about an issue that has no immediate impact on this church?

First, I have studied *The Gadfly Papers*, *The Gadfly Affair*, and two other recent books critical of the UUA. I know there is nothing in any of these books that is outrageous, obscene, or libelous. Anyone who feels "hurt" after reading them misunderstands the nature of political and academic discourse and may try to shut down discussion and debate. When that happens, we cut short the search for truth and meaning, violating our own Fourth Principle.

Second, I could have easily written a book like *The Gadfly Papers* myself. Because I am an old white man (whose sexual orientation may not be obvious), I can see myself in Eklof's place. What happened to him might have happened to me.

Third, I do not want to support financially those who trample on free speech and reasoned discourse. What controversial issue will be the next target of censors? Proud and "woke," the UUA thinks it has done nothing wrong. It surely has not apologized to Eklof or even admitted that it effectively banished him for writing a book the UUA leadership resented.

There is a lot more to this controversy, including disagreements over our denomination's "self-confessed" White Supremacy Culture.
