#### From Your Board: President's Letter

Hello to All of our Beloved Members and Friends during this busy Holiday Season.

Whatever our inherited or chosen spiritual or religious practices are, most of us would probably agree that it's a time of year that a century ago was probably more spiritual and holy than it is now. In the first world countries, especially, there are lots of parties and



occasions between Thanksgiving and New Year, plus lots of obligations to employers, friends, and family. At least that's the case for some folks, but for other people unmet expectations or the lack of or loss of loved ones can make it a sad, painful, or very lonely time.

Disconnection is the problem. Either we can be so busy that we disconnect from ourselves, and we forget to take care of our own needs, or we can become disconnected from others by forgetting to pay attention to the people around us who may be having a hard time, or being embarrassed to reach out...Or BOTH.

Our seventh Principle points out the antidote to disconnection, Respect for the interdependent web of existence. As written by the Rev. Forrest of Shalom Gilmore. Executive Director Community Center. Bloomington, IN, "Our seventh Principle, respect for the interdependent web of all existence, is a glorious statement. Yet we make a profound mistake when we limit it to merely an environmental idea. It is so much more. It is our response to the great dangers of both individualism and oppression. It is our solution to the seeming conflict between the individual and the group.

"Our seventh Principle may be our Unitarian Universalist way of coming to fully embrace something greater than ourselves. The interdependent web-expressed as the spirit of life, the ground of all being, the oneness of all existence, the community-forming power, the process of life, the creative force, even God-can help us develop that social understanding of ourselves that we and our culture so desperately need. It is a source of meaning to which we can dedicate our lives."

## SOME UUCP TRADITIONS, & WHAT'S THE STORY BEHIND

## THE WHITE STARS ON OUR CHRISTMAS TREE?

For as long as most UUCP members remember, the Christmas tree in the sanctuary has been decorated with white lights and white star ornaments. But what's the story behind them?

Hannelore Musial and her late husband, Victor, handmade each and every one!

In the 1920s, when Victor was growing up in Poland, he learned how to fold strips of paper to make the stars, also known as Moravian or Frobel Christmas stars. Each year a new supply of white stars needed to be made as the stars from the previous year were not saved.

Years later, Victor continued making stars for his family's tree here in Pensacola. In the 1990s at a holiday gathering at the Musial home, UUCP member Jeanne Bullivant asked Victor if he could make some for the church tree.

Quality materials and teamwork went in to making thousands of stars. Victor found a local paper supplier who would precision machine-cut high quality paper into the strips needed for the folded stars; Hannelore did the final trimming and finishing.

Not only do Victor's stars decorate the church tree, but for many years, he and Hannelore crafted more stars which were made available to members and friends in the church. Stars grace homes every year in Orlando, Oregon, Montana, South Dakota, Colorado, North Carolina, Connecticut, Virginia, Germany and many other places. Thank you so much, Viktor and Hannelore, for making our tree so special! Speaking of *Holiday Traditions, remember Sat. Nov. 26 at 10am we "Pre-Deck the Halls" by raising the tree. The next day, Sun. Nov. 27 at 11am we decorate our tree with Hannelore and Victor's lovely stars.*

## From the Finance Team:

Ministry Team leaders will soon be receiving communications from the Treasurer regarding budget requests for the 2023-24 (can you believe it?!) church year. You will get a summary of your team's budget for the current year and along with more details on submitting your team's request. Please be on the lookout for these communications and be ready to get your request in during the month of January so the Finance Team will have all of them available when the new budget is crafted in the spring. ## Pledge Payments or Trust Donation, Required Minimum Distributions Make Stewardship Easy

It's the time of year we remind people who are 72 years or older that they can donate to UUCP or to the UUCP Charitable Trust via a **Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)** from their **Required Minimum Distribution (RMD)** without paying any tax on that donation. This is a great way to pay a pledge or donate to the church or the Trust.

<u>What Are Required Minimum Distributions?</u> The Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) is the smallest you must withdraw from employer-sponsored retirement plans each year once you reach retirement. If you fail to meet your RMD, the amount not withdrawn will be taxed at 50%.

The RMD rules apply to all employer-sponsored retirement plans (including profit-sharing plans, 401(k) plans, 403(b) plans, and 457(b) plans). Roth 401(k) accounts are exempt from the RDM rules as long as the owner is alive. If you own of one of these types of accounts and will turn 72 years old this year or have already turned 72, you have an RMD.

<u>How Does a QCD Work?</u>: You direct your financial institution to send the donated funds directly to the church or the Trust before any remaining amounts are sent to you. That way, the donated funds never hit your bank account and are therefore not counted as part of your taxable income. You do not have to itemize deductions to benefit from this arrangement. For example, if you were to make a \$2000 donation to either the Church or the Trust and you are in the 20% tax bracket, you normally would have to pay about \$400 in taxes on this amount, or essentially have \$2,400 in order to make a \$2,000 donation. With the donated monies never entering your taxable income stream, you may even lower your tax bracket.

Please consult with your financial advisor to see what benefits you might get from this option in 2022.

<u>And what is the UUCP Charitable Trust?</u> Just as our IRAs provide us with personal financial stability in times of need, so the UUCP Charitable Trust was founded in 1987 to provide long-term financial stability for the church.

Georgieanna Bryant, Chair of the UUCP Charitable Trust, and Erin Renfroe, Trust member – who are not financial advisors and are definitely, most assuredly, absolutely <u>not</u> providing any actual financial advice in this article.


