# Longtime Member Bio

Jay and Lynne Butcher

Jay Butcher was apprehensive about leaving northern Virginia when his father's civil service job with the Navy was relocated to NAS Pensacola, "but it didn't take me long to fall in love with the Florida

Gulf Coast," says Jay. "With the beautiful beaches and like-minded people I met in school, it didn't take me long to call Pensacola home."

Here too there was Lynne Carmichael—a student at Woodham High School, where the two highschoolers met in 1972, the year of Jay's arrival. Both graduated high school in 1974, Lynne from Woodham and Jay from Gulf Breeze where his parents had settled.



Lynne, like Jay, was a migrant to Florida, but for her, "I have lived here my whole life. I was born in Boston, Massachusetts. My family moved to Pensacola when I was a year old"—a move also a military transfer.

For the partnering young newcomers, 1978 was the culmination year for happenings in their pace toward college education and family union. Reported Jay, "We were married in 1978 at my parents' home in Gulf Breeze."

But for both, education preceded a wedding. Jay received an Associate of Science degree in Industrial Electrical Technology from PJC in 1978, and studied electrical engineering at UWF. Lynne graduated from the University of West Florida with a bachelor's degree in

education, recalling, "I attended the graduation ceremony on Saturday, June 10, and married Jay on Sunday, June 11, 1978."

Careers followed. Jay worked for 34 years as Plant Engineer for Plastic Coated Papers, a local manufacturer. "I have always liked working with and maintaining electrical and mechanical equipment," said Jay. "This job provided me with the opportunity to use and develop my skills to upgrade old equipment to the latest technology and keep the newly installed equipment running at peak performance. This job was always challenging and rewarding."

"My career has been in the field of education," says Lynne. "Working as a Student Services Specialist for Pensacola State College, for the last 25 years I have served thousands of middle school students in the PSC Talent Search program that serves low-income, first-generation, potential college-bound students. I am so proud of seeing my students receive great scholarships, knowing

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that former students are now nurses at Sacred Heart Hospital and hearing from former students this makes me so proud of PSC and our program."

Meanwhile, the couple also has provided next-generation family: "We have two beautiful daughters, Camron (born 1983) and Kadee (born 1985)," says Jay. "We have one grandson, Carson, age 9, from Camron and her husband Josh Gregory." Camron, with a degree from FSU, lives in Destin and is assistant to a county commissioner. Kadee, who has a degree in nursing, lives in Prattville, Alabama.

Move to Pensacola by the couple's parents also brought numerous other family members to northwest Florida. Lynne came from a large family: six brothers and two sisters, with six of those now in Pensacola. Hay's sister, Bonnie Brandon, lives in Gulf Breeze; his sister Beverly Wilson lives in Burnsville, North Carolina.

The mothers of both Jay and Lynne played important roles in the couple's now 34-year membership in UUCP. Jay's mother Vivian Butcher, says Lynne, "introduced us and our daughters to the UU church in Pensacola, back in 1988 when it was called Pensacola Unitarian Universalist Fellowship (PUUF). Shortly thereafter, we became members. My mother, Carol Lynne Carmichael, taught in the UU Religious Education area with the youth at that time." Lynne and Jay joined UUCP in 1989.

Of his UU affinity, said Jay, "I like the idea of freedom of religious expression. Whether you believe in a 'God' or not should be your own choice."

For both Lynne and Jay, the Methodist Church also has been influential, from their childhoods. Said Jay, "I was raised Methodist until I was around 12 years old." Recalls Lynne, too, "I was raised Methodist, but as a child we only attended Easter and Christmas. As a teenager I attended the Methodist youth group." After her mother joined the Gulf Breeze United Methodist Church, Lynne also joined, while keeping her UU membership.

Jay, as a UUCP member, provided leadership as a two-year treasurer of the Charitable Trust, and is currently on the Building and Grounds team.

For Jay and Lynne, both now retired, there is more to do beyond the walls of church and home. "I like being close to the different bodies of water," says Jay. "My cousin Bill Bullivant, who was also a very active member of PUUF/UUCP, taught me to water ski in Bayou Texar shortly after moving here. Later my dad bought a boat, and I was fishing and SCUBA diving in the gulf and water skiing in the bays and rivers around Pensacola." "I retired in in 2020 and enjoy gardening, maintaining our home and relaxing on our deck observing the varied wildlife around the beautiful wooded lot," says Jay. "Our home is in the Woodlands neighborhood and our lot is very wooded—we have seen turtles, snakes, possums, raccoons, and armadillos."

"I got interested in college sports when Camron attended FSU in Tallahassee. I'm still a big Seminoles fan."

Lynne retired April 28, 2023. "I am currently volunteering with 'Take Stock in Children,' mentoring a young high school student. The statewide not-for-profit program is operated under the Escambia County Public Schools Foundation." Lynne's interests always have included sports and recreation, she says: "As a kid I attended the park in my neighborhood. I also love to read historical fiction." Among church events she enjoys, along with Jay, are the music nights, grounds beautification and events like the MLK parade.

Reports Jay, "We recently acquired an RV and will be exploring the country in our 'tiny home.' No specific plans yet in the RV, but we are looking forward to our next adventure."

Down whatever roads the RV steering wheels leads, Jay and Lynne will know where their home is together.

#### Valerie's House By Charlotte Crane

When Jenni Elzweig came to UUCP as a guest speaker on October 22<sup>nd</sup>, few there likely knew that Valerie's House, where she is program manager, was on the menu for an event that afternoon that could "truly be a game-changer," viewed Jenni, for her organization.

The event was positive: Valerie's House was awarded a grant of \$108,364 from Impact 100 at its 2023 annual meeting that day, to help the organization pursue its mission, which is to help children, ages 5 to 18, and families, to work through loss of a loved one and go on to fulfill their lives. For Jenni, the wait that day was nerve-wracking: "I was excitedly anxious when I was speaking to the congregation." That afternoon she attended the Impact 100 meeting in support of Valerie's director,

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its presenter Crista Brandt. Knowing there would be 11 winners among 15 finalists, "When we actually won, we were over the moon," says Jenni.

Valerie's House occupies a Gadsden Street home built in 1904, which was used by a variety of businesses and was recently purchased by Valerie's. Valerie's now plans to make it its permanent location. The grant money will be used to build a brand-new kitchen, making it possible to prepare food onsite and hold cooking classes, "fostering good habits which can be overlooked when a family is in the throes of grief."

Notes Jenni of her UUCP visit, "I was so warmly welcomed by the audience at UUCP, I felt right at home. I have received follow-up messages of support from several members and it warms my heart."
