

had a lot of questions, and they also had a lot of solutions. I hesitate to belabor this point because I don't want to freak anyone out, but it's just good to be street smart and remember that people are actively trying to get you to send them money through deception.

Lauren and I were talking about this on the way home, and just how rotten it is that we have to be constantly thinking of this, but it's a simple reality of our moment. Even if we didn't have this specific breach a few months back, we'd be dealing with this sooner or later in some other capacity. With that in mind, I just want to remind you of two things:

- 1) No one from UUCP will be reaching out to you asking for gift cards or directly for money. If you think that a request seems strange (after all, how many UUs do you know who end their letters with a "blessings"?), it's probably not one of us who's writing asking for money. However, if you think it might be one of us, then call the person directly on the phone with the number you have available on Simple Church. That's one of the best ways to find out if it's real. That said, in nearly every instance, this will not happen.
- 2) If any member actually does need help, I want you all to know that we have a member's assistance fund. No shame in asking, too. Believe me. I grew up dirt poor. My family was the one that received those boxes of canned foods and the free turkey from some random

church for a long period of my youth. In fact, if it weren't for those generous people who donated way back when I was a kid, I don't know where my family would've found food in some pretty lean years. Between "Reagan Cheese" (as they say, "if you know, you know"), food stamps, and church assistance, my family probably would've starved back in the '80s. I'm saying all this to say that when times are hard, and it gets like that sometimes, we are family here at UUCP and we have a member's assistance fund available. This is important to know because there might be a time when you need a helping hand, and I don't want you to think that you need to keep quiet if you need help because everyone's going to think it's a scam. On that note, I also don't want everyone to think everyone's out to get you, too. It's good to be street smart, but you don't have to be cynical about everyone who might need some help, too. There's a balance.

In short, stay generous, keep being street smart, but don't feel like you can't ever ask for help if you need it. We're family, and family looks out for each other.

As always, thank you to everyone who's played a role in our church, whether it's in the present or even the past. We wouldn't be here without all the ones who kept it going long before we got here, and we wouldn't be here now if not for the work that's being done by some really great folks at UUCP. I'm proud to be associated with each and every one of you.

I dropped by February's LB location before meeting at Goat Lips to visit Sree's Kitchen at 5800 North "W" St., Suite 3, just south of the Airport/"W" St. "T" intersection. It's on the East side in a substantial looking "strip center"



(also housing a "halal and international foods" shop where 1.8 kilograms of dried Black Eye peas from Madagascar are sold for \$7.98). When asking for a carry-out menu, the Sree personnel refer you to the calling card rack on which one side says "SREEKITCHEN/SK" and on the other side "Sreelatha Pati" with a QR code with print saying "Scan Me" and a phone number (952-657-6493). So, the digital revolution has invaded the dining industry full force, and I suggest you try the QR. A Googling of Sree's/Pensacola turns up some menu info, but not quite the usual.... The dining room is similar to the Fishing Hole interior, quiet and "tasteful". (I used quotation marks since that's not a word in my common usage.) Not so many tables, so I think reservations will be in order; please let me know by Sunday the 11th.

We had our more or less usual six, plus three newer UU members at Goat Lips, and we did get somewhat more acquainted (but not names; that comes later). We sat in the way-backroom of Goat

New Member Honor Bell On Path to Social Work

Honor Bell III has a mission: Revolution. To Honor, revolution means putting the power of the country and the world in the hands of the working class and disenfranchised.

Honor says four years recently spent in San Diego "...was a revolution for myself. Shortly after moving there, there was a leadership crisis and a time for a mini-revolution at the UU church. So I spearheaded the creation of a BIPOC Platform (Black, Indigenous, and People of Color) calling for and laying out the plan for restructuring church leadership, church programming, living wage compensation for all staff, and more. The program restructuring plan was a framework on how to create services and choose speakers and musical accompaniment. It pertained to having regular



representation in proportion to the demographics found in the area census."

Now back in his native Pensacola with family—biracial parents, two younger brothers, and two nephews— Honor returned to UUCP, which he had previously attended often. Honor identifies as nonbinary. Henceforth, where necessary this article will use Honor's preferred plural pronouns—they, them, their instead of he, him, his.

Honor grew up Catholic, but says, "I always questioned my place in the world. About 18 I searched and found


UU. I appreciate the espoused values." Working at Target often makes this new member unavailable for Sunday services. They would like to see UUCP grow with a diversity of services but currently have no specific suggestions.

Honor was born March 31, 1991, graduated West Florida High School in 2009, and earned a General Studies degree from PSC in 2022. Prior journey considerations have included property management and even UU ministry.

"Since moving back, I've tried to make a new life after COVID and go back to school for a degree in social work...I learned I could do what I wanted to do with more flexibility under the title Social Worker...I plan to stay in Pensacola but don't plan to be the conventional social worker as I am more macro focused," Honor explained.

As previously published in *The Light*, Honor was designated National Association of Social Workers (NASW) Social Work Student of the Year for both NWFL and the state of Florida. UWF graduation with a BSW is expected in Spring 2025.

With work, school, and other obligations, it's hard to find volunteer time, but Honor really enjoys what volunteering is possible with three local agencies: Covenant Hospice, Alfred Washburn Center, and NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness.)
