Technology and a Lasting Legacy From Your Board: President's Letter

Dear friends,

This last month we've seen a lot going on in the church, and I wanted to highlight one thing in particular: technology. Over the next few weeks, we'll be preparing for our annual meeting. The annual meeting is where we get together as a congregation to talk about the budget, but like many things, our budget is a reflection of our priorities. As UUCP continues to grow, we see a few areas where we need to fix—specifically in our messaging.



As you know, we've done a tremendous amount of work in our audiovisual "department" of the church since COVID. If you remember, our online presence prior to COVID was nearly non-existent outside of our website and Facebook page. With the help of Reverend Alice, Erin Renfroe, Laura Keith King, Bill Caplinger, and several other members, we now have a healthy presence on YouTube. Our services have been recorded and sometimes broadcast live. As a result, people who wanted to learn about the church had the ability to watch a few services in comfort of their homes or their phones, or even listen to them on their phones during a walk or while driving to pick up the kids. Considering how much we've grown shows two things: 1) people apparently like our message, and 2) the videos are working. That's great! Now, here's the issue: our technology is outdated and our volunteer crew is getting tired.

We just marked four years since COVID forced us all to learn more about technology. This has been good for many of us, but it also means we need to grow as the technology advances. Some of these advances will help our congregation grow, but to get state-of-the-art technology, we have to spend a few dollars. If the budget gets approved, we hope to use the money that

was gifted to us by our late member Rob Palme to help update our audiovisual presence online and continue to grow the church. Considering the last gift by a member of the Palme family helped to give us the projector we see every week (to see the effectiveness of that, try to think of a service recently where we didn't use the projector), we think this is fitting and our congregation would be good stewards of his donation if it went towards something that we strongly believe will enhance our church and move UUCP well into the modern era.

As you know, Rob was a very generous man with a kind heart. He also loved UUCP. We have honored him by placing his name on our memorial wall, and we hope to continue to honor his memory through a major technology upgrade that will allow our message of peace and justice to resonate throughout the community and help find those folks who need to hear it.

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May LUUnch BUUnch



Well, so much for storm warnings and those days when staying in bed might have worked pretty well (as on 10 April); after much thought (not while in bed), I'm headed to Taqueria Olgy's on Wed., 8 May for the next Lunch Bunch. At 5222 North "W" St. (850 292 4642), Taqueria Olgy's is a little off the beaten track, on the east side of "W", 1/2 block south of Beverly (Brent/Bayou) in a 4-6 shops Strip Center, about the first opportunity to turn left (if south bound). From Google you can note the food

variety, not just the tacos. ... At 1PM as usual; though reservations may not prevail, letting me know will help Michael and I find the right size table and number of chairs.

So how did April's second Wed., the 10th, work out? Well, as I suggested in the April Light and email, I was looking for vegetables and a recently recommended Vietnamese site on Davis, Golden Pho Palace. However, the weather forecast discouraged all with 100% rain and potential tornadic winds; Michael even let me know on the Sunday before that it looked negative. So it was no surprise to find me there alone, about a 3 mile roundtrip with checking the weather up to 12:45. The menu studied, being one of perhaps 4 customers, I thought the Tofu with lemongrass and vermicelli (to-go) about right for my need.

Little did I appreciate, and the main reason I'm writing this review, is that when they say vermicelli, they don't mean "and vegetables". Aside from bean sprouts which looked sufficient in quantity to be intentional, the only other veggies noted (2" carrot strings, and scallion clips) were likely scrapings off the salad cutting board.... So, getting home, tuning up the three local weather forecasts (3, 5 and 15 - I nominate Kelly Foster/15 as the most informative), I ate my lunch until finishing most of the Tofu - nice searing but inconsistently lemongrass flavored and all the vermicelli I needed (but sauce too watery), I still had 7/10 of a pound of only vermicelli left. Obviously, I will ask more questions about veggie contents in the future. -Hugh Ed T.

NEW UUCP MEMBER ATHENA LIETZAU Young World Traveler, "Jill of All Trades"

At

merely 34-years-old, Athena Lietzau has experienced more of the world than most twice her age. An "Army Brat," she grew up on the move, kept at it, and has no intention of stopping. She loves Germany, especially Bavaria, where she has lived three different times, twice in childhood and as a young adult, and enjoyed much of Europe so accessible from that central country.

"I love learning about different cultures and ways of life, and I enjoy feeling connected with people all around the world." Athena recounts. "One of my favorite experiences thus far has been volunteering at a school in Accra, Ghana. The connections I made and the lessons I learned there were some of the most enriching of my life, and I'll forever be grateful for the opportunity. Other than that, a few of my



favorite places to visit have been Istanbul (I only spent a couple days there but it made a huge impression on me), Paris and southern France (I got to study abroad there for a summer), and most recently Japan (I spent a couple weeks traveling there with a group of friends)." She enjoys traveling alone as well as with others.

And her family is also very dear to her: Her mother, two younger brothers, one sister, a niece, and a nephew.

Following a recent period of transition (divorce and loss of her Dad), less than a year ago, Athena moved from Steamboat Springs, Colorado, to Pensacola, joining her recently widowed mother in their new Florida experience. A lover of the culinary arts, especially baking, right now the young woman is working at a donut shop on Palafox St., but she sees law school on her horizon. Her goal: Employment Law, especially to help workers in the low-paying high-demand restaurant business, in which she has years of past experience. "The system is not set up for work/life balance," Athena says, "Some mean chefs, unreasonable demands, sexual harassment, and other issues too often make it especially hard for those who may be stuck in menial jobs. High rates of drug and alcohol abuse and suicide are no accident. I'd like to help. I've always wanted to help make the world a better place."

That sounds like a UU, and Athena is delighted to have found us. "UU Principles sum up what I feel about life," she says, "and I like knowing that all around me are people sharing similar values." Her break with her Lutheran roots started early. "As a teenager, I came out as an atheist. I first learned about UU when I was president of Atheists, Humanists, and Agnostics at LSU. A member suggested attending a UU service, and I was honestly shocked to experience a church that really didn't care what faith I practiced. I had often felt judged for not being religious, and to feel accepted by a group of church goers was pretty eye-opening....I now consider myself agnostic, and I think having my own relationship with spirituality and forming my own beliefs has been very important for me. I feel incredibly lucky to have been able to join UUCP and get to know some of the amazing people here...and fulfilling to spend time with people who're brought together not because they share the exact same beliefs about higher powers and an afterlife, but because they share similar values and beliefs about how we should be treating each other and the world around around us in this life,"

Athena says. "I'm looking forward to gradually getting more involved; I'd love to work through the church to more directly help underserved communities and take action for social justice."

Her interests and skills are multi-varied. She started singing as a child and is now active in our choir. Ukulele playing came at LSU in Baton Rouge, where she enjoyed the Cajun culture, was active in social issues, and

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graduated Summa Cum Laude. She loves school, enjoys logic and a good argument, tendencies handy for law school. Yet her creative interests are also strong: painting in various media, musical theater, knitting, crocheting.

She quips, "I guess I'm a Jill of all Trades. She is attracted to life in major urban centers, and aspires to live in NYC.

UUCP Hosts Pensacola Abortion Rights Taskforce Event

On March 29, members of the Pensacola Abortion Rights Taskforce (PART) organized an event at UUCP that brought out several dozen people to give a history of the long struggle for abortion rights in Pensacola, with part of presentation devoted to the church's contribution to this fight.

The event began with a film screening of the film "Pensacola's Struggle for Abortion Rights" that was researched by our own Lauren Anzaldo. The short documentary focuses on our city, with some of the focus on the UUCP congregation that was so heavily involved in those movement to protect women's right to seek an abortion. During the early 1990s, several members of UUCP helped with clinic escorts, largely organized by Bill Caplinger, the point of placing their bodies on the line to fight against religious fundamentalist efforts to stop women from exercising



their rights to seek a legal abortion. In 1993 and 1994, religious fundamentalists shot and killed two doctors in Pensacola, killing one UUCP congregant in 1994. The film highlighted the murder of Drs. Britton and Gunn, along with the murder of clinic escort James Barrett, while bring the story into the modern era.

UUCP actively participated in clinic escorts before and after the 1993 and 1994 murders until Ladies Clinic was ultimately firebombed and burned down by a religious fundamentalist in 2012.

After the film, a dynamic panel convened to briefly speak on various aspects of the local history of abortion rights. The panel featured Robin Reshard (local historian), Paula Montgomery (physician and UUCP member), Ashley Faulkner (abortion rights activist and clinic escort), and Robin Blyn (founder of PART). After short presentations, the panelists held a brief Q and A that only ended because of time constraints with the hired security guard for the evening's events—a stark reminder of the still volatile situation in Pensacola and across the United States surrounding this topic.

Another screening of the film will be held in the near future, followed by a longer Q and A with Dr. Paula Montgomery and Bill Caplinger to speak more on the role of the church in the events of the mid-1990s and the role of the church in helping to bring a tentative peace to the anti-abortion protests outside of the Ladies Clinic. The date for this event will be posted as soon as available.


