Hello friends,

This month I begin my term as your UUCP board president, and it's an honor to serve a congregation of such excellent and admirable UUs. I'm very excited about the projects and progress we have in mind for the coming year.

One initiative, the fruits of which I hope you will see soon, is an upgrade to our audio-video equipment. Many guests and new members have told us that they watched our YouTube videos before they attended in person, to get a sense of what we're about. These videos take a lot of behind-thescenes work to put together — thank you, videographers Ed and Laura and editor Erin! — and the audio quality has been limited by proximity to the podcasting microphone at the lectern. 


UUA Common Read

For July 10th's (2nd Wednesday) Lunch Bunch, we'll venture to Cottage Café (CC), south across Gregory from the downtown/Main Library, just west of Spring Street at 203 W. Gregory, Ph. 850-437-0730. Perhaps some of you saw the recent PNJ (rather long) article on the CC. It's not like we've ignored the Cafe in the past, we just haven't been there in six or more years.... The menu (on line) is perhaps unique with the desserts (Homemade Treats) coming between the salads and the sandwich/wrap selections (and the Quiches and the Soups).

I checked by at CC before opening, and the next time, on Vacation until July 1st, so no info on whether they take reservations. The inside wooden chairs and tables have a comfy and cool look, while the outside

table/seat/sunshades setups look good for the right time of the year, but not for July, I anticipate. If possible, I'll reserve for 6, and if you haven't been one of those 6, lately, let me know (Sunday, July 7th). They stop taking orders at 1:30.

Our Wednesday June 12th outing was for six, and proved that Golden Corral's 6-seat table and chairs can be a bit tight for us, they reasonably fit that we represented.

As to the cuisine, well, no surprises on the high side I guess; I usually find the salad bar pretty basic but a good place to start -but no avocado. No particular high points in the veggie line, though I usually find their tomato/okra (no protein succotash ?) satisfactory. (Usually is meant to indicate my once/twice a year visits, though only a 10-12 walk minute from home.) The blackeye peas disappointed, but when I finally reached the fish preps, I felt OK. And though you can no longer get, and walk out with a soft-serve ice-cream cone, I did find a slim piece of very-chocolaty chocolate pie worth appreciating. -Hugh Ed T.

UUCP NEWCOMER PENNY FENDT: Lots of Love, Now Including 7 "New" Siblings:

Penny Fendt joined UUCP in April after losing her beloved husband Hank just seven months before. But UU isn't new to her. She was active in the Toledo, Ohio, UU Church, raised her oldest daughter in their Religious Education program, and served as head of a Wednesday evening adult ed program. The UUA course Building Your Own Theology is a particularly fond memory for her as for many of us who enjoyed that at "PUUF," Pensacola Unitarian Universalist Fellowship, our predecessor, at 903 E. Scott St.

Penny moved to Pensacola in 1983 and attended

PUUF before marrying her second husband, Retired Navy Commander Hank Fendt in 1986.

After divorce from her first husband, Penny directed a Senior Citizens Center, then worked for the Toledo Heath Department until the early1980s auto industry decline impacted that region and took her job. That loss brought her to Pensacola, where she had friends, and she has gladly remained here.

Her family life is richer than she ever imagined, steadily growing in several directions.

Penny's first child, Korinne Akridge,

now 54, lives in Boulder, Colorado, where Penny loves to visit her. Penny's beautiful gouache mountain painting captures the exuberance felt when that daughter made it through serious cancer.

After marrying Hank, Penny left PUUF to join United Methodist Church on 12th Ave, in which he and his parents were charter members with deep personal and family roots.

She also helped raise his three young children. Daughter Kristin Fendt died of Lupus at age 25. Sons Edward, 45, and Ryan, 42, remain in this area. They and their children are quite active in Penny's life.

Her theology, she said, is simply UU. "I know people need to love each other and need to figure out how to love each other and the earth." Penny spreads love to both humans and nature. The day of our post-questionnaire interview, she and a friend with the Native Plant Society had spent two hours in the June heat putting cards on doorknobs of new neighborhood homes encouraging native plantings compatible with bees, butterflies, and other creatures. She enjoys being active: Bridges to Circles (now defunct), Learn to Read of NW Florida, League of Women Voters, Pensacola Impact 100, JUST Pensacola, and more. She says, "I just want to

contribute something that helps locally." Her varied career has also reflected that inclination. Beyond the Ohio work, in Pensacola she owned a service that cleaned homes after fires and floods, then worked for Sylvan Learning Center before soon owning one, then two Sylvans in Santa Rosa County, north and south. "That was my absolute favorite job," she exclaims. "If I was awake I was working on it. It was rewarding to help children succeed in school and I also loved my teachers and directors as we learned new ways to improve. I miss it terribly since retiring in 2012."

Although Penny's adulthood has been in Ohio and Pensacola, she was born in Manhattan, NY, adopted, and raised in Ridgewood, New Jersey, from birth to 14, then Huron, Ohio, where she completed high school. Her bachelor's from the University of Toledo was in public health with a minor in mathematics. The woman loves math.

Her family life has multiplied in recent years, not only with grandchildren ages 2-34 and her first new great grandchild, but—thanks to DNA services 23 and Me and Ancestry, and the first outreach of her biological mother's oldest legal daughter—she has added seven new half siblings! Three from her DNA mom, later four from her DNA dad.

Penny originated from a WW2 affair between two service people who were married to other spouses.



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When her bio mother's husband could not accept this pregnancy, Penny was adopted by wonderful parents. She knew nothing of her origins, other than that she was adopted as an infant by two parents who loved her unconditionally: "They encouraged me physically, educationally, and emotionally. I was a very lucky girl."

Once Mildred and Henry Purwin died, Penny listed herself in 23 and me, was spotted by her unknown half niece who alerted her mother, Linda Le Davis, who lives in Cal. "Le" Davis was the only one to know her mother's secret, and, since her mother had also passed, finally decided to share and connect. Thus, all their lives were greatly expanded and enriched. "All have reached out to me in a loving and accepting way," Penny says.

Through frequent texts, phone calls, and a serendipitous visit, Penny and Le have become

particularly close, though living across the country; Penny cherishes photo books of her "new family" plus a handmade quilt and pillow Linda sent. Le's son happens to live near Fort Walton and now visits Penny often. They plan a family reunion in Las Vegas where one of Le's daughters' lives.

Also, through DNA services, and a vigilant half cousin, Penny has also connected with the four legal children of her bio dad, and fostered that relationship. At their reunion in Nebraska, she learned about that father and his fascinating personal and family history. She's exploring all sides now, particularly through our local genealogy library.

While still grieving the loss of her dear husband, Penny Fendt remains multiply enriched, beloved, and very far from alone.


