
A Blessing for the Dying



NEWCOMER ORIENTATION

Recent UUCP Members and Friends as well as prospective Members are invited to join us for Newcomer Orientation at UUCP. This interactive orientation will take place in the sanctuary following Sunday Service that day. Childcare is available during this service.

The orientation will provide useful information about our church while allowing you to meet and interact with other newcomers to UUCP. Topics covered include how to get involved in the activities of UUCP, the rights and responsibilities of membership, Fun & Fellowship activities, our budget pledging, and Children's Religious Education communication program. our systems, and more! Orientation is presented by the Membership Team with support from other Ministry Teams and the UUCP Board.

UU Churches Vandalized

Two of our UU congregations have been recent targets of arson and vandalism. First Parish UU Church in Kingston, Massachusetts and the UU Church of Lawton in Oklahoma both had their buildings broken into, fires started, and property damaged which will need thousands of dollars in repairs. These are both

small congregations and I am glad that they can reach out to sibling UU's through <u>Faithify</u> for help in covering the cost of repairs and continuing their mission. I suppose this is part of the risk of being a denomination that sides with Love and publicly displays support for people who have been marginalized.

In <u>Lawton</u>, the church has been repeatedly vandalized since 2019. Graffiti has been scrawled on their building and now the violence has escalated when their community free pantry was set on fire. They are asking for help to install security cameras and make repairs.

In <u>Kingston</u>, their Black Lives Matter and Pride flags were burnt, historic windows and shutters broken, and a fire also set inside the sanctuary. They are asking for help with repair costs.

These instances are tangible proof that enemies of justice use terrorist tactics thinking we will recoil in fear, but they are so very wrong. We will double our efforts. We will draw the circle ever wider. We may be afraid, but we use that energy to fuel our courage to create a more inclusive and caring world where all have what they need to live in peace.

For the Luncb Bunch on the **2nd Wednesday of August 2024**, **the 14th**, we will be treated to a seminar on Nutrition 101 (Getting More From the Foods You Eat) at the new Bear Family Foundation Center, Baptist Hospital off Brent Road near I-110 (125 Baptist Way), 2nd Floor. Conference Room, courtesy of <u>ebaptisthealthcare.org/events</u> for which you need to register, or phone 448.227.4939. (This detail comes to me bi-monthly by BHC postcard,) I suggest registering by **Monday the 12th**.

The speaker, Sarimin Rivera dietician/diabetes educator at BMG Endocrinology, I've heard once before and she covers the material/Q&A very well. The conference

room, 2nd floor, is reached from the east side parking lot (I-110 further to the east) via the entry doors, then the 100' hall to the west/large window side of the building for an elevator - for which you choose you floor, 2, before entering the elevator; or you can take the steps. The conf. room is both wide and deep, with the lunch fare (typically chicken salad wraps) usually near the large windows on the south side, from which you proceed back toward the front of the room. Several viewing screens, front and side, assist with illustrations for the talk.... Best to be earlier than 11:30. Questions to me at UUCP on Sunday the 11th (or by phone/email).

What are your pronouns? My pronouns are "she" and "her".

ROOTS: Where were you born and raised?

I was born in East Ridge, TN (just outside of Chattanooga) then soon moved to Maine where my parents originated. I have five sisters—one older, four younger. I graduated high school in 1992 from Calvary Christian Academy in Turner, ME. I attended college at Pensacola Christian College for one year and then moved to Rossville, GA (just outside of Chattanooga) with my family and attended Tennessee Temple University in Chattanooga, TN for one year. After that, I moved to Greenville, SC with my family and took a break from school to work for a bit. I married my first husband in 1996. I went back to school at Furman University in Greenville, SC where I graduated with a Bachelor of Music in Music Education in 1998. I taught in the Greenville County School District for six years. In 2009, I separated from my husband and moved to Pensacola, FL to be closer to family. In 2018, I married Michael Viron and in 2019 graduated from the University of West Florida with my Master of Education in Educational Leadership.



CAREER: Current or former work, chosen profession? What did you like about your career?

I am currently the Response to Intervention Coordinator at Bailey Middle School in Pensacola, FL. This school year is my second year in this position. Prior to this, I taught first grade for two years and elementary music for nine years in Escambia County Schools in Pensacola. I had taught elementary music in the Greenville County School District in Greenville, SC for six years. In between teaching in South Carolina and teaching in Florida, I have held many different jobs, one of which was creating websites for small businesses.

The best thing about my career is being able to make a positive difference in the lives of many people. I am currently working toward becoming a school administrator. Each year, I gain more experience that will help me achieve this goal.

Through my work, I have learned to be patient, look for the good in others, and find common ground with my colleagues. I have learned to lean on my team when needed and be there for others to lean on me as well.

I was born in East Ridge, TN, but grew up in Maine and still have many family members there. My family left Maine many years ago for financial reasons. We ended up in South Carolina and stayed there for many years. I moved to Pensacola after my divorce to be closer to more family members.

What do you like about the area?

The views over the water in many places are gorgeous. For example, I enjoy the view when driving over the I-10 bridge from Milton to Pensacola and the view at Pensacola Beach.

Special interests or hobbies – now or in the past? Sports, music, reading, art, community volunteering, lobbying for a cause, other?

I enjoy knitting, crocheting, tatting, singing, reading, and playing musical instruments. My husband and I also enjoy going to sporting events (hockey, baseball, football) throughout the year.

Life's adventures you'd like to share. Travels, raising a family, helping in the community, getting involved with organizations, starting and running a business, etc.

Michael and I have not been able to have children which prompted us to look into adoption. We are now in the adoption process and look forward to the day when we will eventually meet our child. Until then, we are training our new puppy, Sadie, to be sure she is ready to welcome a new family member.

What is your religious background? When did you become interested in Unitarianism, and what is there about it that appeals to you? Were other family members associated with a Unitarian Church, specifically UUCP?

I was raised independent, fundamental Baptist which is an extremely conservative version of Christianity. I became Associate Reformed Presbyterian as an adult for a time and eventually figured out that I am an atheist. I was already in Pensacola when I realized I was atheist and attended meetings with the Gulf Coast Freethinkers. They led me to UUCP at that time. I was very relieved to find a church community that would not try to convert me to a particular set of religious beliefs.

After a while, I drifted away due to other commitments in my life (getting married and studying for my Masters degree). I came back because of the adoption process and my lack of social life. During our adoption interviews, we were asked if we would be willing to take our children to church and if we would be willing to adopt a gay or transgender child. My first thought was that we needed to reconnect with UUCP to ensure they would have a supportive community around them.


Were you a member previously?
