Recently, the UUCP board held its annual retreat, and I am happy to report that our time together was both invigorating and inspiring. Whether through our engaging Sunday services or the many other ways we come together as a community, let us welcome the fall with open hearts and a shared commitment to our UU values.

Ingathering & Water Communion

Presenter: Claire Helton, UUCP member

Annually we mark the significance of our community coming back together as a congregation after the summer months. September 15, 2024

Rituals and Practices of Ifa/Orisha

Presenter: Reverend Ruth Spears, also known as Chief Iyanifa Osunfemi, a non-denominational Christian minister.

Rev Spears will describe the rituals and practices of Ifa/Orisha as well as its evolution through slavery and into the current day. Ifa/Orisha is a West African spiritual system dating back more than 10,000 years and became one of the most ubiquitous African spiritual foundations to be integrated into American culture, its Catholicsyncretized sister, Santeria having become fairly ubiquitous popular culture.

Second Hour: Heathen Kinship, Service Leader Training

September 22, 2024 Equity Project Alliance

Presenter: Dr. Lusharon Wiley, Executive Director/Equity Project Alliance

The Equity Project Alliance (EPA) grew out of the desire to create a more equitable Escambia where everyone can live well and thrive. The EPA understands that to be successful in bringing about

transformative thinking, education and interaction have to take place. James Clear wrote, "Sitting down at a table with a group of strangers has the incomparable and odd benefit of making it a little more difficult to hate them with impunity." He goes on to say, "Perhaps it is not difference, but distance that breeds tribalism and hostility." The EPA shortens the distance between people by bringing them together to discuss issues ranging from social injustice to arts and culture. We understand that bringing people together can lead to transformative thinking and ultimately, to transformative action.

Second Hour: Service Conversation Continued

September 29, 2024

JUST (Justice United Seeking Transformation)

Presenter: Tricia Wessel, Lead Organizer for JUST Pensacola

Our congregation voted to join JUST Pensacola forces for justice with 17 other congregations of different faiths in Pensacola five years ago. Since that time, a lot has happened, including the COVID Pandemic and a few floods and hurricanes. UUCP has come through strong and getting stronger. The same is true of JUST Pensacola. Tricia Wessel is the new Lead Organizer. She moved

here from an academic career in Wisconsin and hit the ground running in May of this year. She is visiting the member congregations and attending the organization's trainings, in addition to catching up on ongoing projects. She will bring us up to date on JUST Pensacola as we begin the next justice cycle. As part of the service we will be organizing the house meetings for collecting ideas for injustices that need our attention.

After the service, Tricia will be available to meet and greet us over coffee.

Coffee Hour Crew and Clean up





For September's 2nd Wednesday I've been tempted by the barely a-year-old Bubba's 33, on the northwest corner of Davis and Creighton. So, for 11 Sept. at 1 PM, we'll try it out. I did take an 11AM/Monday view of the activity, so anticipate that reservations will only be taken at the door



with all potential seat users ready to walk in, but I'd like to have a heads up about who plans to wait for... by Sunday, the 8th or Monday email.... FYI, the parking is on the west and north side of the building, and it's entry on the south/Creighton side. Also, the menu reads pretty well on-line, with no prices; ask for my copy if you're interested. (I did consider New Hong Kong House, further south on Davis, and decided their higher prices could wait awhile.)

And how was our August 14th Registered Dietician with chicken salad (by Firehouse Subs) at the new Baptist Hospital on Brent? Up to expectations. I was later told by one our members that called the day before to be told that there were no more seats left. Indeed, the room capacity was expanded by about 50%, suggesting to me (mental count) that about 110-120 were present. Ms. Saramin and her "slide" presentation was up to par and she did handle a number or question's re dietary intake, but particularly, her info on the vegetables inherently endowed with the right daily nutrients was of special interest. 
